Columbia College's 2,500 Graduating Students To Transform South Loop With Carnival of Creativity Showcasing Talents to Employers and Public

Chicago (April 15, 2015) – Manifest Urban Arts Festival http://www.colum.edu/manifest/ brings audiences into the action this year with a series of interactive performances and exhibitions for those interested in being part of a zombie movie, transforming into an alien creature, testing new game designs, or exploring futuristic Sound Art and 3D Media Installations. The annual festival of creativity and pageantry by Columbia College graduating students is free and open to the public and takes place on Friday, May 15, 12 – 9 p.m., in the Wabash Arts Corridor (Congress-Roosevelt).

Manifest features a mind-bending extravaganza of runway fashion shows, robotics, writers, original musicals, food and art, jazz and jive, pop-up galleries, art sales, soundscapes, street art, stage combat, sketch comedy, dance, and more. Cutting -edge DJs and musicians perform indie rock, jazz, blues, soul, R&B, dance, folk, country on six stages, with buzz-band *Twin Peaks* closing. Eight galleries showcases top visual artists working in traditional and new media. Storytellers screen work that explodes the notion of traditional film and television.

"Manifest is the most extraordinary year-end college event in the country," said Mark Kelly, the Vice President of Student Success and Manifest creator. "Our celebration of student success has become this remarkable showcase of next generation cool in the creative industries. Manifest attracts 30,000 people annually, including employers, talent scouts, and art collectors looking for the next big thing," Kelly said.

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

The Good Old Neon Wilderness December 16, 2014

I've just finished reading-looking at, actually--a remarkable new book: "good old neon" by Nick Freeman, a former advertising man turned painter and photographer who lives in St. Charles. It contains scores of beautiful, colorful and vibrant photos he took of neon signs--some lost, some still here--from around the Chicago area.



I realize that these days the

South Loop has a dirth of neon. Some of the most notable signs in the book were in my neighborhood at

one time. And I miss them.



Like the sign on the former Hotel Roosevelt at Roosevelt and Wabash. I regret never entering the place when it was a fleabag at the end of its lifebefore becoming an affordable apartment building. I do miss the nice flashing neon sign that graced the building before it turned "respectable."

Then there was the good

old Pacific Garden Mission at Harrison and State-now the site of the new Jones College Prep. For decades, one had to do a little praying to get a roof over one's head and a good meal. And I presume religious services are still a part of the land-scape at the new location at 14th and Canal.



The/Gay Villa is gone, too. And pretty much forgotten at Cermak and State. I never knew it existed until I read the book, and started feeling nostalgic about what the 'hood has lost in the way of good old neon. (Notice the establishment tried to obscure the "gay" in its name at some point in time, in favor of the word "The.")

We South Loopers are lucky because just beyond our "official" South Loop borders, there are three neon signs that are still there for the looking. The Berghoff on Adams, just west of State; Central Camera on Wabash, just south of Adams; and last but not least, Live Poultry at 244 W. 26th Street.



But I say, instead of regaling what was or tracking down what is, the book, which was recently mailed to me from Lake Claremont Press is a best bet for appreciating what our city and its neighboring communities has/had to offer in terms of the "gaudy, garish and spectacular." The beautiful pictures tell the whole story.

Brick-Paver Crosswalk and Street Re-Striping Coming to Dearborn/Polk Intersection

A reader writes:

As a frequent user (as pedestrian and driver) of the Dearborn+Polk intersection, I have looked forward to painted cross walks and lane lines ever since repaving happened last fall. Today I got this update from Dean Argiris in Ald. Fioretti's office that explains the situation. I thought your readers might be interested. I personally am looking forward to the brick-paver crosswalks.

Last year our office funded the installation of brick -paver crosswalks at Polk/Dearborn. These are high visibility crosswalks that are safer as motorists can see them from farther. They are scheduled to be installed sometime this year, CDOT should circle back to us with a time frame.

As for the street re-striping, I believe this was put on hold because there was a small stretch of Polk that remained to be completed. Last I was informed, there is some underground utility work expected to be done and when that is completed, they will resurface that section and do a complete lane marking.

Once I get the time frame for those projects, I will let you know. In the meantime, ... I have asked CDOT to throw down some temporary markings.

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

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

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Book Review: "All the Light We Cannot See" by Anthony Doerr


I usually avoid reading novels and short stories with characters who are blind. Too many fiction writers portray blind characters one-dimensionally — we're either heroic or tragic, bumbling or, particularly lately, blessed with super-powers.

But Anthony Doerr isn't like other authors.


One of the main characters in Doerr's current best-selling novel, "All the Light We Cannot See," is blind, but there's much more to Marie-Laure LeBlanc than that. She grew up in Paris, her father is raising her on his own. The two of them evacuate to a village in Brittany called St. Malo after Paris is invaded by the Nazis, her father goes missing, and she's a teenager by the time the Americans arrive on D-Day.

Doerr writes in third-person, and his chapters are very short — they swing back and forth between the changes young Marie-Laure is enduring in France and those that Werner Pfennig, an orphaned teenager in Germany, faces when placed in an elite Nazi training school there during WWII. The author avoids using visual descriptions in the chapters about Marie-Laure, since they are written from her point of view. I've been asking friends who have read the book if they have any idea what Marie-Laure's beloved Papa looks like. I love the pause before their answer. They hadn't thought about it, but, hmm. The answer is...no.

There is little, if any, visual description of Étienne or Madame Manec (the pair Marie-Laure and her Papa live with in exile) either, yet readers come to know these characters very well, the same way those of us who are blind can know the people we love. Here's an example from early in the book, before Marie-Laure's cigarettesmoking Papa goes missing:

"Every time she comes within earshot, Marie-Laure hears the "Pfsssst!" of her father lighting another match. His hands flutter between his pockets.


Afternoons he repairs things around Étienne's house: a loose cabinet door, a squeaking stair board. He asks Madame Manec about the reliability of the neighbors. He flips the locking clasp on his toolcase over and over, until Marie-Laure begs him to stop."

Marie-Laure doesn't have to be able to see her Papa to know he is anxious, and neither do we. If Marie-Laure could see, the author wouldn't have pointed out that she sees the cabinet door he is fixing, he would have just said "he's fixing a cabinet door." And so, he doesn't use extra words to point out Marie-Laure hears the squeaky cabinet door, either. We know he's fixing the cabinet door the same way Marie-Laure would know, and that helps us stay right in her head and experience her life during WWII the same way she does.

As I continued reading, I noticed how often Doerr chose the verb "find" rather than describe Mari-Laure "feeling through" something or ""touching" an object. Sounds simple, I guess, but to me, keeping it simple like this is brilliant. Over and over again, the author resists the temptation to sound trumpets to remind the reader that Marie-Laure can't see, and that keeps readers in the moment. Here's another example, this one from later in the book when Marie Laure is alone and escaping into the attic:

"Only thing to do is climb. Seven runs up into the long triangular tunnel of the garret. The raw timbered ceiling rises on both sides toward the peak, just higher than the top of her head. Heat has lodged itself up here. No window. No exit. No where else to run. No way out, except the way she has come."

The passage continues: "Her outstretched fingers find an old shaving bowl, an umbrella stand, and a crate full of who-knows-what. The attic floor boards beneath her feet are as wide across as her hands. She knows from experience how



much noise a person walking on them makes."

Isn't it something, the way that using senses beyond the visual can make writing more, well... colorful? Here's one more example: a quote from Marie-Laure near the end of All the Light We Cannot See -- I especially related to this quote:

"When I lost my sight, people said I was brave. When my father left, people said I was brave. But it is not bravery; I have no choice. I wake up and live my life. Don't you do the same?"

I just might borrow some of the verb choices and twists of phrase that Anthony Doerr used in "All the Things We Cannot See" in my own writing now. It's enlightening to learn that a sighted writer can teach me new ways to describe the way I see things.

LGBT community is not alone April 3, 2015

A cab driver who picked my Seeing Eye dog and me up once had such a heavy accent that I couldn't tell what he meant. "Dog face on floor," he said. "Saliva." He repeated that word a few times to help me understand. "Saliva. Saliva. Saliva." Was it his mantra? My face must have betrayed my confusion, because the driver went on to explain that he was Muslim, and in his religion dog saliva is impure. "Dog mouth is near me, seven times I must wash."

The driver understood that United States law required him to pick up people with disabilities who use service dogs, he just wanted me to keep my dog's face on the ground, far from him. Whitney wasn't crazy about the idea, but I appreciated him explaining this to me, and I've long believed that reasonable accommodation goes both ways. I commanded "Down!" Whitney laid at my feet, and I placed my hand on her head to keep her there.

Once home, I looked this dog saliva thing up, and sure enough, the <u>ruling comes from the hadith</u>: The Prophet, peace be upon him, said: "If a dog licks the vessel of any one of you, let him throw away whatever was in it and wash it seven times."

That cab ride came to mind again last week after Indiana's divisive Religious Freedom Restoration Act made news. If the Governor signed it the way it was originally worded, I wondered if Muslim cab drivers in Indiana would have the right to refuse people with disabilities who used service dogs.

As it happened, my niece Janet invited me to join her and her two youngest kids on a Spring Break road trip to Indianapolis, so we were there the very day the Indiana governor signed the state's Religious Freedom Restoration Act into law. Nine-year-old Floey loves to practice her sighted-guide skills with Great Aunt Beth, and 6-year-old Ray never tires of folding and unfolding Great Aunt Beth's white cane, so Whitney got a Spring Break, too: she stayed at home while we were gone and played with my husband Mike. I didn't hear about the new amended law until I got back home -- sounds like if Whitney comes along the next time I head to Indiana, the law is still on our side.

Mondays with Mike: Masters of the universe-not





Well, Chuy Garcia lost the Chicago mayoral runoff election, despite the endorsement of the prestigious *Mondays* with *Mike* blog.

It wasn't a bad showing considering Garcia got into the race very late, had no name recognition, and was widely considered the second or third best choice of possible opponents to the incumbent Rahm Emanuel.

That Chuy got 46 percent of the vote speaks to the depth and breadth of dissatisfaction with Emanuel as much as anything. Rahm is behaving as if he's been chastised into turning over a new leaf. I'm not holding my breath for Scrooge on Christmas morning, though.

Meanwhile our new governor, Bruce Rauner, is doing his best Scott Walker impression. Whether he can enact some of the stuff he's talking about is yet to be seen. I'd implore Rauner to read this piece comparing Walker's policies to those of his Democratic counterpart in Minnesota, Governor Mark Dayton. It's about as close to a scientific experiment as you can get in politics, and it does not speak well of Walker's choices.

The governors of Wisconsin and Minnesota are both wealthy, Dayton probably the wealthier of the two. Which only goes to show, you can't generalize too much based on wealth.

And it is too easy to generalize about "the rich" and "the poor," glorifying or vilifying as we see fit. Of course, defining rich is problematic. Compared to lots of people I walk by on Chicago streets every day, I'm filthy rich. But to coin a phrase, some of my best friends are rich, and these friends are...rich. They are also thoughtful, caring and generous people. They pay attention to the world around them, outside their comfortable existences, and understand that they had some advantages as well as hardships, they understand themselves to have some responsibility for the well being of others, and of the country as a whole.

That doesn't mean I always agree with them on government policy, or that we always vote for the same people. It does mean we have respectful conversations where I always learn something for my trouble, and hope they do, too.

But there is a particular subset of people who *do* worry me. They come in multiple political stripes. They've done well and interpret their doing well as meaning they know everything. And they get insular. They can afford to buy their way into priority everything, they don't rub elbows with people unlike themselves. They forget they had support. That they got breaks. They develop a distorted view that assumes that those with less most certainly deserve to have less.

In the restaurant of life, these are the people who behave as if, because they're paying for a meal, they own the servers. In real life, these people are buying public office. They're appointing their friends to positions in education, transportation—you name it—even though those pals have no experience in those fields. They're doing it confidently because, well, they think they know everything. And they seem never to have enough.

Brasserie at LM: Dueling Reviews

Walk through the bright lobby of the Essex Hotel to the Brasserie at LM and you are greeted by a decoupaged life sized horse, a central bar and seating along street level Michigan Avenue. We found friendly service and good coffee but at \$3.50 a cup you want to get your fill. Breakfast entrees generally range from \$8 to \$12. I ordered the eggs Benedict adorned with tomatoes, arugula and ham smothered in a béarnaise sauce and accompanied by piles of sliced fried potatoes topped with Parmesan. Though good, it was a symphony of starches. I don't recall a fruit substitute but hindsight suggests I should have asked.

You can get a good variety of the French themed breakfast choices here like quiche, croissant sandwiches and baguettes. There's more variety in the Brunch menu as well as prix fixe lunch and dinner selections as well. And did I mention a Kids Menu?

We did not sample the beer or wine choices -at eight in the morning - but the long line of taps looked substantial. It is a brasserie after all.

Brasserie by LM is located on Michigan Ave in the Essex Hotel, and with the sun shining on a brisk March day with a view of Grant Park, nothing could put you in a better mood, except perhaps a satisfying French breakfast. If you want "Adam and Eve



on a raft," you'll have to go elsewhere. This is a French Bistro that serves unpretentious food. I have eaten here several times for a casual dinner and have not been disappointed. Although I was tempted to order the "French Toast," (and I love French Toast), I went with the recommendation of the waitress with the

French accent. I ordered the Brie Croissant for \$11. A fresh baked croissant, scrambled eggs, brie, arugula, and for meat, I chose the turkey sausage. Since it is a croissant sandwich, I would in the future, avoid links and choose the bacon. The scrambled eggs were fluffy and moist, the brie balanced the sweetness of the bread. Other breakfast offerings included Steel Cut Oatmeal, smoked salmon ba-

gel, crepes, the quiche of the day (however, we were too early for the quiche), and beef hash. Also, a variety of pancakes and French toast, omelets, an American Breakfast and the LM Benedict. If you are looking for something a little different for breakfast, I would recommend Brasserie by LM. The food was fresh and flavorful and the offerings are, for the most part, different than most restaurants serving breakfast. You can tell by the number of patrons with a European accent, this must be a destination for tourists.

Brasserie by LM is located at 800 S. Michigan Ave It has a large bar with a seating area also a separate dining room.

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Dime Stories: The Long Cruel Line

By Tony Fitzpatrick The Union Stock Yards have been closed since 1971. The century of suffering, human and animal, still bears much historical currency. We are still thought of in literature as "Hog Butcher for the World." Upton Sinclair's "The Jungle" brought great change in the meatpacking industry—until this great novel, nobody inspected the meat we ate. Six months after "The Jungle" was published, the U.S.D.A.

started inspecting the slaughterhouses and the meat being issued by them. It was a grimy, filthy business; the Armours and Swifts built threadbare shanty-towns for their workers, mostly Czechs, Poles and Ukrainians. The conditions were so unsanitary that workers often brought home blood-borne diseases on their clothing and skin—there were no wash stations or showers. At one point the infant-mortality rate was so high that one out of three children did not live until their first birth-day.

It was a cruel life imposed upon generations of immigrants, all the while building great fortunes for the Armours and Swifts. I write this because I realize this has always been a city of great cruelty—to people, to animals—and somebody always profited from this suffering. It's a little late in the game to be surprised by this yet, still, I am.

I think one must be naive to think that a city is built on nothing but good intentions and decent-minded citizens. New York, Los Angeles and Chicago were built by hustlers, thieves, villains and dirt-bags, not to mention murderers. Back then it wasn't considered murder to kill first-nation people. It was viewed as "settling" a territory or "procuring" a tract of land for a railroad, a city, an industry.



Signs Go Up for 611 Eatery at Vetro Condo Building


A reader writes:

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





Man Arrested for Roosevelt University Fire, Suspect in DePaul Blaze: Police

CHICAGO — Police have identified and arrested a Lincoln Park man in connection with an April 1 fire at Roosevelt University.

Lavale Miller, 35, of the 1000 block of West Fullerton Avenue, was charged with one felony count of attempted arson and a misdemeanor count of criminal trespassing after he set a fire in a trash can at Roosevelt's campus in the Loop.

Police said no injuries were reported and surveillance footage helped them make the arrest.

Officer Janel Sedevic, a Chicago Police spokeswoman, said Miller is also a suspect in recent fire incident at DePaul University that occurred the following day, also set in a bathroom trash can.



Sedevic said they were able to arrest Miller on the Roosevelt charge because "there was more evidence" for that crime, as compared to the fire at DePaul, making it an "easier charge" to prove. She said they are working hard to gather evidence in the DePaul case.


