

Jone's ribbon Cutting for rehabbed building

As reported by city hall and local media, Jones College Prep celebrated the renovation of the "old" school building on Aug. 13 (which was originally slated to be torn down), with a ribbon cutting ceremony attended by Mayor Rahm Emanual. The mayor is quoted as saying at the time: "I said, 'A lot of people are talking about taking it down and just putting grass' and then both the assistant principals and the principal described the fact that at that time there were about 11,000 applicants for a total of 250 seats each year, but 250 more kids could get in, who were qualified, but there was no availability," No mention or credit was given to a very vocal group of community citizens who organized under the name "Reuse Jones." This was a joint effort between South Loop Neighbors, Greater South Loop Association, Prairie District Neighborhood Alliance and Alliance for a Greener South Loop. Their website stated their goal. "We are a diverse group of active and passionate South Loop residents working to save the current Jones building and turn it into a neighborhood high school. Why tear down a building worth saving in a community that needs it?"

Alderman Fioretti supported the reuse of Jones for a new high school by saying: "Any neighborhood that seeks stability, safety and enhanced recreational resources needs a high school — a public high school open to all. It's the one amenity that the 2nd ward lacks. This is the chief reason I have fought over the last five years to keep the old Jones building from being torn down. As the central city area (including the South Loop, Near West Side and Chinatown) has blossomed over the past decade, we've gained all the other basics - grocery stores, cafes, pharmacies, banks. We've got new L stops and new parks, but no neighborhood high school." Local residents Richard Weindorfer, John Jacoby, and Enrique Perez testified before the Chicago Public School Board after the decision to save the existing building only to have it merged with the selective enrollment Jones College Prep.

According to the press release issued by the city, "The renovated building features a new student resource center, art rooms, a multi-purpose room, a fitness center with locker rooms, a pre-law lab and a permanent canopy linking to the new high school building. Jones also received architectural renovations, mechanical and cooling plant upgrades, as well as renovations to the exiting cafeteria."

Parents in this neighborhood, for the foreseeable future, will have to grapple with sending their kids to private high schools or move to the suburbs.

JONES CTE PROGRAM IS FOR

NEIGHBORHOOD KIDS (This is a re-run of an article that ran May 31, 2013 in the Dearborn Express) In the CTE Program, 75 places are held for local kids of which 37 are for law and 37 are for engineering. CTE stands for "Career & Technical Education." It is made up of approximately 40 different programs of study. Since the South Loop paid for the school,

we have the opportunity to let our kids go to Jones but only through CTE if they did not make it in the regular way. If you are accepted into a CTE program, it is a four year commitment. The selection process is over for the school year 2013 – 2014. Apparently, there were not enough neighborhood kids or all did not gualify for



the CTE program creating available spaces for kids not from the neighborhood. At any rate, the applying student would have to evaluate whether they would really want to commit to four years of law or four years of engineering.



The CTA finally did something right: the Harrison Red

Line station entry

We have lovely new pieces of architecture in the

South Loop: the two new Harrison Red Line station entries on State Street. They're everything. Simple, pretty, tasteful, diminutive, functional and very cute and architecturally meaninaful.

I'm no architect. Or urban historian. But I know what I like. And the new Harrison Street station entries work for me.

So there. You see, I'm not a

chronic complainer. I like something brought to me by the CTA. But I am astonished that the CTA is capable of making good design decisions after all the bumbling in recent years.

From the disastrous Ventra rollout to everything else they've done. Although, I have to admit Ventra seems to be working now at the turnstiles and the bus machines and it doesnt 't seem to be overcharging or stealing fees from poor people. Or is it? Let me know if you know of any egregious ripoffs still going on.

Then there's those new trains where seats go to waste because most people take up two seats. (We get fatter, the seats get smaller, does that make any sense?) And if you're lucky to get an unencumbered seat, your arms have to stay so close to your body it's impossible to read a book or a tablet or even a smart phone. 

CHICAGO (WLS) -- One firefighter was injured after crews responded to a fire in Chicago's South Loop Wednesday morning. The call came in for the 2-11 fire at 1169 S. Plymouth Ct. before 8 a.m.

The injured firefighter sent out a mayday call after running out of air, officials said.

"Guys quickly got him, got him to an open window and in a short period of time were able to get him out of the fire apartment," said Deputy District Chief Steve Chikerotis.

Crews were then able to knock down the fire fairly quickly. The flames were heavy but contained to a single third floor apartment unit.

Building engineer Eddie Pagan, who smelled smoke, alerted others in the building to get out, starting with the woman who lived in the unit where smoke detectors could be heard buzzing. "I went up there to see if she was still up there, but she had already come out," Pagan said. "I went and knocked on everybody's doors to get the residents out."

One person was taken to the hospital in good condition and treated for smoke inhalation. The cause of the fire is still under investigation.







I have a deep-seated desire, a need even, to try to keep up with current events. And lately, I've been thinking that's gonna kill me. Between bankrupt domestic and local politics, and conflicts here and around the world that continually point out the human genius in finding ways to terrorize, brutalize, and diminish other humans, it can overload anyone trying to make sense of it all.

I find myself needing more than an escape—I need evidence that people are—or at least can be—good. Luckily, here in **Printers Row** in the summer time pretty much any weekend, Beth and I can find joyful evidence of goodness at **Chicago Summer Dance**.

It's just a three-block walk from our building to the Spirit of music Garden on the western edge of Grant Park. For the last 18 years, the City of Chicago's Summer Dance program has presented an hour-long dance lesson, followed by a live performance by some terrific swing bands, salsa bands, and DJs. It happens all summer long, Fridays, Saturdays, and Sundays.

This summer's weather has been as gentle and mild as the past winter was wretched. That's how it was this past Friday evening—warm, not hot; breezy, not humid. At dusk, with Chicago's skyscrapers shining in soft sunshine framing the scene, at least a hundred folks lined up for a swing dance lesson.

The dance floor was expanded awhile back—but it was still crowded. The instructors knew what they were doing, though, and somehow the hour flew by. <u>The Fat Babies</u> played on Friday—they are a superb traditional jazz/swing septet that's earned some justified acclaim of late. We'd seen them at their regular gig on a rainy night at a Pilsen club called <u>Honky</u> <u>Tonk Barbecue</u>—Beth's <u>trombone-playing brother</u> <u>Doug</u> sat in for a bit the night we saw them. On Friday, as always, lots of people came out just to hear the music--they bring lawn chairs and little picnics and ring the dance floor. And everyone was in good spirits and behaved like, well, civilized people.

The band was terrific.





But the dance floor is always the best. Short dumpy men whose footwork belies their physiques dance with statuesque women. Young couples who take their dance seriously and dress the part. Young black men dancing with women who look like my middle-aged mother. Blue hairs and kids, black people, white people, Asian people and Hispanic people, drag queens, guys that wear yachtcaptain hats. Women in flowing dresses and impossible heals.

All partnering with one another, the only condition being you have to want to dance. It's a liquid tableau of color and people.

And every time I leave, I'm reminded: It's not all bad.



Columbia College Teams Up with Shepard Fairey and "The Provocateurs" Exhibition

Columbia College Chicago has teamed up with Shepard Fairey (OBEY series, Obama HOPE) and three other Art Alliance: The Provocateurs artists to showcase their work in the Wabash Arts Corridor as part of the exhibition with Lollapalooza. Four of the top names in subversive street art— Shepard Fairey, Cleon Peterson, POSE, and RETNA—will use the corridor as their "living urban canvas," injecting provocative, large-scale artworks into one of Chicago's major emerging art scenes.

Mental health advocates blast Emanuel's clinic closings

Mayor Rahm Emanuel's two-year-old plan to close six of the city's 12 mental health clinics came under withering attack Tuesday, with advocates accusing the mayor of throwing Chicago's most vulnerable residents to the wolves.

Cut off from familiar therapists and forced to travel longer for treatment, thousands of patients fell through the cracks, sometimes tearful mental health advocates claimed.

Some desolved into depression or returned to past addictions. Others were arrested, turning Cook County Jail into, what Sheriff Tom Dart has called the "largest mental health hospital" where patients are "criminalized" instead of being given the care they desperately need.

On Tuesday, mental health advocates and their City Council allies aired their bill of particulars against Emanuel, first at a news conference, then at a public hearing that dragged on for hours.

Ald. Bob Fioretti (2nd), who is mulling a campaign for mayor against Emanuel, reiterated his apology for the vote he cast in favor of the mayor's first budget, balanced, in part, with the clinic closings.

"It was probably the worst vote I ever made. We were told certain information. And if we would have had other information, that vote would never have happened — by many of us, if not everyone in the City Council," Fioretti said.

"Do we want a City Hall that closes its back on clinics and public schools and turns its back on Chicagoans most in need? Or do we want a City Hall that stands up for the needs of all citizens, especially those who don't have much money and... need the extra support."

Ald. Roderick Sawyer (6th) added, "We were told when we voted on this that no one would be left behind. That obviously was not the case. For that, I am truly sorry. We let you down. But an old friend once told me, 'When you make mistakes, that's why they put erasers on pencils.' You can change mistakes. You can make it right."

N'Dana Carter, a spokeswoman for the Mental Health Movement, branded Health Commissioner Dr. Bechara Choucair a "liar" for claiming that the city is providing more mental health care with six clinics than it ever did with twelve.

"Never trust numbers that don't put faces to it and change every other week," Carter said.

"Smoke and mirrors is fine for the circus, but this is not a circus. This is human lives.... When they closed the clinics, a lot of people had nowhere to go. We're talking about a few hundred initially that rolled into thousands.... We don't know where a lot of them have gone."

Carter urged Chicagoans to call their aldermen, call the mayor and make three demands: re-open all six shuttered clinics; order the Department of Public Health to accept Medicaid patients and bolster funding for mental health services in the city's 2015 budget.

"A city cannot thrive if more than 20 percent suffers. If your brother falls, he falls on you — and your brothers and sisters are falling. We are our brother's keeper," she said. (continued on page 18)

At an unrelated news conference that preceded Tuesday's hearing, Emanuel stuck to his well-worn script: The clinic consolidation that saved the city \$2 million has worked for both the city and its mental health patients.


"Because of the reforms, we have more clinics with more visits and we use the resources — not to actually deal with just the budget deficit. We finally addressed the concerns of lack of psychiatric care. It's close to about 4,500-to-5,000 more people now are receiving psychiatric care, a benefit we could not do because of the way we structured it," Emanuel said, citing his work in Congress on mental health issues.

"The goal is to get more people health care coverage quality coverage.... We've expanded coverage to more people and, more importantly than just more people, expanded also new benefits like psychiatric care that never existed because the old system did not loosen up the resources.... Making the touch choices, the reforms necessary to achieve the goals."

Five years ago, then-Mayor Richard M. Daley tried to close four mental health clinics, only to back off under pressure after it was revealed that a faulty billing

system had forced the state to withhold \$1 million in funding from the city.

One of the issues the public may have is understanding the components of a lease. 1 Landlords are usually property owners who are willing to lease their property to make a profit. Therefore rent is one of the first clauses in the lease contact followed by lease terms and deposit. Before entering a lease you must consider initial use of property, live, work, pets ,zoning, Most leases contain a clause requiring the tenant to abide by all applicable laws and regulations, including zoning.

Security deposits are intended to provide landlords the ability to pay for repairs or unpaid expenses incurred by tenant upon termination of lease (not to be used before hand) Although lease provisions may include additional conditions indicating when the security deposit money is/when to be used, the deposits are rarely sufficient to cover them. Thus the landlord has not the funds for reimbursement for misuse or neglect. Security deposit should never be used as last months rent.

Duration of lease is supplied in the body of the lease. the duration of the lease will be for a period equal to how rent is paid (e.g. monthly, quarterly, annually) until lease term expires.

If term is month to month, then notice must be given not less than 15days prior to end of any monthly period. Quarter to quarter notice not lease than 45 days prior to end of quarterly period and year to year, then notice must be given not less than 3months prior to any annual period.

If tenant does not give proper notice than they will be required to pay next rent installment. Again this should all be written into lease and explained to both Lessor and Lessee prior to signing and move-in.


