University Center Sold for \$201 Million to Blue Vista Capital Management In case you missed this last week (via Crains):



Three downtown colleges have switched from landlord to tenant after completing the biggest student housing deal ever in Chicago.

A nonprofit formed by the three schools—Columbia College, DePaul University and Roosevelt University—just completed the \$201 million sale of University Center, a 1,729-bed building in the South Loop where their students live, according to Cook County property records. The nonprofit sold the 18-story building at 525 S. State St. to a joint venture led by Blue Vista Capital Management, a Chicagobased real estate investment firm that specializes in student housing.

The deal will free up money for the schools to spend on other purposes, though they now will pay rent to Blue Vista. Under the deal, the colleges signed agreements to lease a "vast majority" of the beds in the property for 10 years, said Blue Vista co-founder and CEO Peter Stelian, declining to elaborate. Another local school, Robert Morris University Illinois, has signed a shorter-term master lease for a batch of beds in the building, too.

That's a lot of money - but we guess it's a pretty big building in a pretty prime location. August 20, 2017

Where once stood a magnificent garden at the corner of 8th and Wabash, now stands nothing.

Columbia College Chicago did a very bad thing. Where once stood a magnificent garden at the corner of 8th and Wabash, now stands nothing.

And it's all the college's fault.

The story goes like this: When Columbia purchased the old Buddy Guy's a few years ago and tore it down in order to build a brand new student center (Buddy moved a block south into nice new digs), suddenly they couldn't.

The <u>student population that paid tuition started to dimin-</u> <u>ish (and continues to do so)</u>, and the college found itself with far more property than they could use in the South Loop. I was nervous when they purchased the Johnson Publishing Company building on South Michigan Avenueand wrote <u>a column back then about how good they'd</u> <u>been about restoring, renovating, repurposing (and even</u> <u>building new) buildings</u> in the neighborhood, and how I hoped they'd continue that magnificent record.

It didn't continue. The JPC is fallow and never used. And for sale.

But something wonderful happened in the meantime to the land upon which the student center was to be built. It was handed over to CCC book and paper making art students and a number of huge raised planters were placed on the empty lot filled with impressive plants that the students used for paper making. A water source was also implemented and everything was wonderful.

The concepts in the garden expanded, along with the plantings, under art professor Melissa Potter's direction, and they included everything from "war" to tea-making.

Anyone could walk right into this garden and feel refreshed and renewed. There was no fence. No barriers. What a respite. In fact, one of the planters was in the process of being dedicated and named for community activist Bob Wilson, who had recently passed away. The plants had been donated from <u>another community garden</u> <u>at Polk and Dearborn</u> a few weeks before--and planted by members of the South Loop Referral Group.

While Potter and the students knew from the start that their days were numbered--the college announced they would begin building the student center on the land in October--they were also assured that another spot would be given to them on campus to transfer their garden.



But a few weeks ago, in the middle of the growing seasonwithout notice--the college <u>pulled a Richie Daley/Meigs</u> <u>Field</u> and, without notice, one morning began tearing out the planters and the plants. When <u>Potter and the students</u> <u>found out hours later, they rushed over to save what they</u> <u>could</u>, but....

Unanswered questions abound: why weren't Potter and the students given notice and enough time to salvage their plants? Why did they do this dastardly deed in July if they weren't ready to break ground until October--the natural end of the growing season? Why was there such a level of disrespect for Potter, the students and the community?

Not to mention the level of disrespect for the plants....

We like to look at other peoples' jobs as easy. If they don't meet our standards? They're lazy or incompetent. Sure, we bow to brain surgeons, airline pilots, elite athletes and the like. But waiters, bartenders, construction workers who have the nerve to be taking a break—we freely disparage them when they fall short. We're a bunch of Yelpers

I've come to realize that everybody's job is actually harder than it looks. I had a discussion with a bartender a few days ago and after trading stories, we agreed: The United States should adopt a military draft with a national service option. Don't want to go into the military? Then national service, with an emphasis on *service*. Waiter. Customer service agent. Gate agent at the airport. No one gets out of it, regardless of family wealth or education.

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Book Review: Karan Mahajan, **The Association of Small Bombs** (Viking 2016)

The Association of Small Bombs is a support group for loved ones left behind after a bomb explodes but kills only a few people. With little press or political import in a country where people are inured of cataclysm, such bombings are unevenly prosecuted and best disregarded. One character, a Kashmiri separatist and veteran bomb-maker with missing fingers, growls that "Terrorism is about making other people believe in your power," but even small IEDs have large impact.

The **Association of Small Bombs** is also a gripping but sometimes maddeningly slow story about the lives that preceded-- and proceeded from-- an explosion that embarrassed its perpetrators and barely attracted the attention of the government they opposed. In the opening pages, Karan Mahajan uses almost too many beautiful words to walk us into the eye of this particular and personal storm. We are close enough to feel the heat and barely escape the shrapnel from the blast. But two little Delhi boys are not as lucky, and their best friend, a Muslim boy who survives the bomb, is shattered and shuttled back into its vortex by the book's end.

Mahajan's third-person narrator knows all the players and all sides of the story: the lost, the grieving, the guilty, the innocent, the radicalized. He observes as they wrestle with existential questions about what they do and what has been done to them. Only 276 pages, the singlespacing gives a visual clue about the book's density. We meet four parents of two dead boys and one survivor. We track terrorists, some of whom read Ayn Rand and Gandhi; some pray (for forgiveness, or at least mercy); some fret over the physics of bomb-making or the temptation of masturbation. All, Mahajan argues, have "idiosyncratic, personal" reasons for their abominations. And for every character, "Historical and sociological and political explanations, necessary as they are to making sense of terror, don't capture the tiny, intimate urgencies that power the life of a person caught in their web." Mahajan does.

Read it.

What we can learn from immigrants

Wanda Bridgeforth and I had a ball during our <u>interview</u> <u>on WGN Radio</u> last night (7/29/17), and as our amiable host Dave Hoekstra walked us out of the studio afterward, he called out, "Wanda, you're a pistol! Will you come back to do another show?" As they say in radioland, "Stay tuned."

Audrey Mitchell and I were a hit at our <u>Skyline Village</u> <u>presentation Friday afternoon</u>, too. More on both of those events later this week. After Dave Hoekstra's program comes out online I'll be able to blog with a link to the radio interview and publish some photos from last night -- and photos from Audrey's Friday afternoon appearance at Skyline Village, too. In the meantime, allow me to introduce a couple other writers in my life.

Some of the most talented writers in my memoir classes are immigrants. Wanda is one of them: born in Canada, she came to Chicago as an infant. Other older adults in my classes came to Chicago from Czechoslovakia, Austria, the Philippines, Germany, India, France, Egypt Anu Agrawal immigrated to America from India in 1969. She's in Wanda and Audrey's downtown memoir-writing class and generously agreed to let me publish an excerpt here from one of her essays.

"The Travel" opens with Anu pointing out that "when we travel by bus, train or airplane, we have all the information about our travel plans." What would life be like if we had the same information for our life journey, she wonders. Would we live differently if we knew how long our life journey would last, if we knew when we'd arrive at our final destination?

"Maybe not," she decides.

"I see the same human behavior in our short travel by bus, train or airplane," she writes. "Some passengers are good decent people, who are warm and helpful to others; but some are selfish and mean."

Two women Anu encountered on an overnight train journey in India in the 1970s still stick with her now, some 40 years later From her essay:

One good looking seemingly wealthy woman in her early forties was sitting across my seat. She had occupied two other seats by putting her belongings, which she could have easily put under her seat. But she wanted to grab as much space as she could and did not care for the inconvenience to other passengers. She had an arrogant and smug look on her face. There was another young woman with a child who had occupied only one seat. she had simply put her belongings under her seat and held her child in her arms. She looked very contented and had gentle, calming look on her face.

Whenever I have doubt about my travel behavior, these two women pop up in my mind to guide me.

Another talented writer in my life, my <u>friend Carolyn</u> <u>Alessio</u> left her job as a writer and editor for the *Chicago Tribune* Book Section years ago to teach at Chicago's Cristo Rey Jesuit High

School, a school known nationally for its innovative ideas and emphasis on building student character.

I'm not sure how she finds the time, but while teaching a talented group of high-energy teenagers, Carolyn has also managed to continue writing. She is the prose editor at Crab Orchard Review, and her work has appeared in The Push-cart Prize Anthology, TriQuarterly, Boulevard, and, last week, in Scoundrel Time.

Carolyn's *Scoundrel Time* article <u>Sanctuary, City</u> begins with a description of reading Elie Wiesel's *Night* with a freshmen English class on Chicago's largely Latino Southwest Side. She had to go over vocabulary words like "invective" and "anti-Semitism" with her students, but one term they had no trouble understanding? Deportation.

From the piece:

Even though our school's students reside legally in the United States—documentation is required for the corporate internships that finance their tuition—everyone knows members of the community who are not so fortunate. To my students from La Villita, or Little Village and nearby, the number includes neighbors, friends, relatives, coaches, church members, and local business owners.

Carolyn's piece is very well-written, and the first-person accounts of her teenage students (all of them documented) and the feelings they carry around for relatives and neighbors that may be taken away from them gave me a different look at immigration--and immigrants--in our country today. It also reminded me of how much we can learn about ourselves and our country from the experiences of immigrants. I hope you'll <u>read the entire piece</u> -- we can all learn a lot from these high schoolers.

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Grant Park: Legacy and "Legacy" From an Immigrant Mayor's Gift to a Composer's Presidential Tribute

"It's true I didn't come over on the Mayflower, but I came over as soon as I could," said Anton Cermak in 1931, in response to xenophobic slurs made against him by the deeply entrenched, and deeply corrupt, Chicago mayor "Big Bill" Thompson. Threatened by Cermak's political skill and alarmed by his growing support, Thompson resorted to a strategy of personal insults and dark hints that Cermak wasn't "normal."

This strategy has a familiar ring to it, of course; but Thompson's xenophobic and alarmist tactics backfired wildly, and Cermak rode a wave of immigrant support into the mayor's office. Unfortunately he was killed before he could finish out even his first term—shot in the lung at a political rally by a deranged gunman who was apparently aiming at FDR, with whom Cermak happened to be shaking hands at the worst possible moment.

Cermak's sentiment that he came to America from what is now the Czech Republic "as soon as [he] could," speaks powerfully to me. You see, I'm a sentimental sort, the kind of guy who gets all choked up thinking about the idea of America as a melting pot, as a place where diverse peoples from around the world can live together in peace. Monday, August 7, 2017 Himalayan Express Opens at 606 S. Wabash; Mai Tai Also Apparently Opening at 614 S. Wabash

It looks like Himalayan Express is officially open at 606 S. Wabash. As a reminder we got wind of this back in May. According to a press release:

Napal natives and co-owners of the Himalayan Restaurant Group, Vivek Kunwar and Kiran Byanjankar, have proven their ability to recreate the authentic flavors and dishes of their homeland. Now the partners will open a third location as a new Indian dining concept and Chicago catering hub in Chicago this week. The restaurant at 606 S. Wabash will offer a unique express menu as well as the full sit- down service currently offered at its locations in Gurnee and Niles, which opened in 2003.

"There's a new trend to express dining," says Kunwar. "Business people who want an authentic Indian meal do not necessarily have the time to sit down for lunch." The express menu will be the first of this style for the cuisines of the Asian sub-continent of India.

Express diners will have a choice of five entrees plus rice, sauce and side dishes for \$7.69. The main courses include fresh vegetables, paneer, vegetable kofta, chicken and salmon. There will be a choice of four rice varieties, five sauces and five sides. Also available will be a la carte dishes such as Biryani (spiced rice), Momo Steamed and Momo Jhon (soup). Vegetable, chicken and lamb versions of these dishes will be served. "Selections will change periodically based on the preferences of our customers," adds Kunwar.

Beyond this, it also looks like a new Asian restaurant called Mai Tai is also opening in this building:

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Education Update: Results of GSLA's Community Surveys on the Near South High School Plan

This post summarizes the key findings of two GSLA surveys which followed the first and third community meetings held by CPS to gather feedback on a proposal to expand the South Loop Elementary School's boundary southward to 22nd Street and close the National Teacher's Academy elementary school (NTA) to repurpose it to serve as a 1,000 student high school which would be available to students residing in the South Loop, Chinatown, Armour Square, Bridgeport, and north Bronzeville areas.

The purpose of the first survey was to gauge the community's sentiment regarding key themes raised during the June 6 meeting held by CPS, where the proposal was officially presented to the community for the first time. The purpose of the second survey was to gather feedback on the version of the plan presented at the July 10 meeting, which has evolved from the one originally presented on June 6.

Who responded?

We received a total of 217 responses across both surveys (n=162 and 55, respectively), which were configured to not allow multiple submissions from the same IP address in order to limit the ability of individuals to submit multiple responses. We estimate that the surveys reached over 4,000 people.

We asked each respondent to identify with a stakeholder audience: parent of a student at SLES, parent of a student at NTA, parent from greater Chinatown area, community member who plans to send a child to public school in the future, or community member who does not have plans to send a child to public school.

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1006 S Michigan Ave. Suite 600 Chicago 60605 info@roiholisticfitness.com | 312.818.1191 The distribution of respondents across these stakeholder audiences was similar for both surveys; approximately 40% from NTA, 20% from SLES, 30% from community members who plan to send kids to public school in the future, and 10% from other stakeholder groups.

What was the response to the first survey?

The main themes raised during the first meeting were:

Requests to see other alternatives presented by CPS Concern regarding the lack of community/stakeholder inclusion and lack of transparency by CPS in the development of the proposed plan

Concern regarding the disruption and displacement of NTA students, the majority of whom are low-income and are thriving in their current school

The survey was designed to capture sentiment regarding these 3 areas, and results and key themes are outlined below.

Alternative Plans and Capacity Concerns:

- 83% Agree or strongly agree that CPS should share alternative plans for providing quality Pre-K-12 public education options in our community. 9% disagree or strongly disagree.
- 86% Agree or strongly agree that CPS should provide 5-year projections of the populations of South Loop Elementary and National Teachers Academy (current boundaries of both schools). 4% disagree or strongly disagree.
- 87% Agree or strongly agree that CPS should provide 5-year projections of the number of anticipated graduating 8th graders from each of the elementary schools in the South Loop, Chinatown, Bridgeport, and Armour Square neighborhoods.
 5% disagree or strongly disagree.

I just wanted to update you on your story of the deconversion of River City from 2016. In the last 2 years, Marc Realty has made 2 offers to buy all the condo units in River City in a bulk sale. They failed to gain the necessary percentage (75%) of owners' votes both times.

They have now made a third offer to buy the building. Apparently they plan to force us to vote over, and over, and over again until they find the minimum price that will get the requisite number of votes. The whole process has been unfair to owners who don't wish to sell their homes, and has failed to protect their right to enjoyment of their property. As result of Marc's repeated attempts, The normal business of the building has been disrupted for two years, and the lives of 450 owners has been put on hold because of the uncertainty of ownership.

This process is an abuse of a law that was never intended to facilitate hostile takeovers of property by greedy de-



velopers who see a chance to cash in on hot neighborhoods. In Florida, this kind of abuse led to a change in their law to require 90% of owners to agree to a bulk sale. Illinois should follow Florida's lead.

Light the Way...

As the days grow shorter we look for ways to keep the light shining. Since the loss of our beloved incandescent bulbs, which gave us a warm glow, reminiscent of firelight and sunrises / sunsets, we look to the lighting industry to provide a replacement for us. Since the curly fluorescent only provided awful blue light (that left no one looking or feeling good) the LED folks have stepped up and given us the alternate source we've craved. You can create the look you want with the spectrum of light from a warm glow to bright daylight. Check out the following charts for specific figures about what to look for when shopping for fixtures and/or bulbs.

Of course, there is one tiny problem if you are like me, and have invested in good quality lamps around your home over the years that can give you 100 watts to actually help you see what you are doing, you may have found that replacing the bulbs with LEDs that fit into the socket is near impossible. But wait... there's hope...

I was one of those "light bulb hoarders" and only recently ran out of my supply of 100W incandescent bulbs. On my third trip back to the store, trying to find an LED bulb with the shape base (for standard A19) that was slender enough to fit into the socket of my Kovacs floor lamp, the fellow at the counter asked "Why not just get some incandescent bulbs?" Laughing, I replied "Hey buddy, if you have a stash, I'll take all you've got". A few minutes later he appeared with an 8 pack of Ecosmart 100W bulbs (package says uses only 72W and based on 3 hours use a day will last for 1.8 years). Best part- they are DIMMABLE.

Brightness-1150 lumens

Color- 2800 K for a nice warm light

So there you go. Enough people screamed and the industry and our government regulators actually heard us and gave us our bulbs back. Now, with all the cool new fixtures in the market place you won't have any problem finding bulbs to fit.
