## Large Crowd Showed up at South Loop Neighbor's Candidate Forum.

## Australian Lungfish "Granddad" celebrates his 80th anniversary at the Shedd



Granddad, an Australian Lungfish and the Shedd Aquarium's longest living resident passed away February 5--from old age. He lived at the Shedd since 1933 and was probably at least a pre-teen, if not older when he got there.... He was beloved and well-cared for at Shedd and lived a good, long life. Here's a post South Looper Bonnie McGrath wrote in 2013, when Granddad had his 80th anniversary party. Not only was he the longest living resident at Shedd --he's also probably the longest-living resident in the South Loop! He's was here almost 87years!

When I met "Granddad" in 1978--the year I started volunteering, and ultimately working for pay for the next three years at <u>Shedd Aquarium</u>--he was just about to celebrate his 45th anniversary as a South Loop resident. And I thought he was old then! <u>Yesterday, the famous Australian Lungfish celebrated 80 years</u> in his river habitat home at the Shedd. He's been living in the South Loop a lot longer than I have. I've only been here 19 years. But we both came to live here during the month of September, although I arrived 61 years later.

So I went up there yesterday to help him celebrate his big day. I've been visiting Shedd since I was a toddler. My dad used to bring me to see the turtles in a shallow pool near the entrance. Which was replaced by a coral reef decades ago.

Granddad is probably something like 90 years old now, give or take. Almost old enough to be my granddad. No one will know exactly until he passes away how old he is --which probably won't happen until he's way past 100. Australian Lungfish are long lived. The whole <u>species goes back</u> hundreds of millions of years. And he has a good life lolling around in his tank, with friends, good food and a lot of attention.

The <u>Queensland Lungfish</u> (its other name) eats slowmoving aquatic creatures--like worms and crayfish and shrimp and such. In captivity, lungfish love things like lettuce and other veggies; not to mention grapes and bananas. They love a nice varied diet. And they have the ability to swim up to the surface and breathe air through their mouths, too. Which is probably one of the things that's allowed them to survive as a species all these millions of years. served after a few congratulatory speeches, was made of seaweed, raspberries and carrots, among other things. And it was thrown right into the water With him. He and his pals noshed on it while we guests were given information about Australia--and little pins with both the Australian and US flags on them.

Granddad, who's been here since the World's Fair of 1933-which was held near the Shedd on Northerly Island--didn't seem too interested in going back home. He's pretty happy in the home he's been in for 80 years.

The weather has been, all things considered, very pleasant. Greetings from the land of towel warmers and biscuits. It's gloriously sunny and only a little brisk in Edinburgh, Scotland. We're a few steps downstairs at a little café drinking some potent black coffee, eating croissant and a bacon and cheese scone. We found it after being directed to a Starbuck's just across the street—we chose wisely.

Wellington Coffee, our little slice of caffeine heaven. Last night we stopped at <u>The Oxford Bar</u>, the spot frequented by <u>the fictional detective Inspector John Rebus</u> in the entertaining series of mysteries by Edinburgh's own Ian Rankin. Rankin <u>has</u> <u>penned his thoughts about the real-life tavern</u>.

Oxford Bar was all that. Or, I should say, it wasn't all that. It was quiet. Civilized. It acknowledges its Rebus connection, but this is no Maragaritaville. It's still just a pub.

The conversation was rich. Bartender George and Harry the patron were deep into talks about music. George used to play in a band full-time back in the 70s and 80s, and he'd taken up music again for fun. Business was at a civilized pace and between patrons, and between serving patrons, Harry reviewed the lyrics of Whiter Shade of Pale, which his present-time band had added to its repertoire. All of us found lots of common ground in our awe of songwriters, including Carole King, whom Harry absolutely revered.

Later we visited with Fiona and John and their two handsome sons, Andrew and Douglas. You may remember that Fiona is the sister <u>of Sheelagh</u>, <u>our longtime friend who died from cancer</u> <u>several years ago</u>. Fiona visited us last year. We are lucky to remain connected. We had a lovely evening, starting at grand and traditional pub called Bennett's, followed by dinner at Fiona and John's.

Throughout our journey, conversation has inevitably turned toward our current president. What was striking is how well informed our UK friends are. For example, back at The Oxford Bar, Harry and George knew the intricacies of our three-headed system, and held out hope that it would insulate us and them from catastrophe. They also knew our election cycle: "It'll be better in two years," said Harry, hopeful for the prospect of a Congressional turnover in the wake of two years of expected nuttiness.

Before heading to Scotland, <u>we spent three days in with our</u> <u>friend Jim Neill</u> at his London flat. We were in his living room on inauguration day. Jim is a political junkie and he and I watched the ceremony on BBC television while Beth sequestered herself for a nap.

For the record, things back in the USA don't look a lot better from across the pond. (Also for the record, Jim immediately commented on how less-crowded the mall seemed compared to what he had remembered from previous inaugurations.) An American should be reminded that, for better or worse, we have carved out a primary and incontrovertibly important (as opposed to "alternate") role in world affairs. These people in the UK are dealing with two unnerving developments: Brexit and a president that to them appears to be at a developmental level somewhere between high school senior and college sophomore. Our time with Jim included a visit to his father's home in Hartlepool, located in a region that the Motorway signs label simply as The North. Hartlepool was once a shipbuilding power, but went through the same kind of hollowing out during economic transitions that our so-called rustbelt cities of the USA did.

Hartlepool is also a long, long way from London—not so much in distance as culture. Our talks with people along our journey confirmed that some things are universal. For one, the urban/nonurban divide. We have a good friend, Lydia, who immigrated north (and I really think that's the best term) to Chicago from the South to the chagrin of her family. They routinely and painfully referred to Lydia's adopted home as *That Chicago*. Someone spoke to us and used the phrase *That London* in much the same way Lydia's parents used *That Chicago*.

We stayed overnight at Jim's father's house. Jack is a hale octogenarian who walked us at a remarkable pace to the house of Carol and Phillip, his daughter and son-in-law who live about a 10 minute stroll away.

Our hosts served wine and finger food and we didn't have to work hard to coax his father and sister into telling embarrassing stories from Jim's childhood. We also got to know Carol and Phillip's youngest daughter, and learned about their son who is working in London, and their other daughter, a student at university. At some point, Phillip recalled his time as a teenager in the Navy, when a few of his ports of call included American stops. Out of the blue, as he gazed off in his own imagination, he said, softly but firmly, "I love America."

I wasn't sure I'd heard him correctly and asked him to repeat it. He went on to tell stories about his times in the USA, stories that his daughter hadn't heard and which opened her eyes to the idea that her father had not always been her father.

Phillip recalled one stop in Norfolk, Virginia, where his British aircraft carrier moored next to the U.S.S. Nimitz. "Our ship was the biggest in our navy, and the Nimitz was twice as large!" More than that, though, he was impressed by the kindness of the American families that met the Brits at the dock to offer them housing or any help they needed during their stay. Norfolk's residents know what it is to have loved ones at sea for extended periods. Mostly, I've stayed away from news sites and social media as much as possible. While we're away, I'm taking a badly needed break. But I did see the reports about the marches around the world, in cities across the USA, and particularly, my Chicago friends' social media dispatches. It was heartening, and I got the same feeling—strangely---that I'd had when we were stranded in New Orleans (how awful!) a few years ago because a huge snow-storm had shut down Chicago's airports.

My first impulse: I wanted to be there, despite it all. It is home. All of it, good and bad.

Than again, a single-malt later, I realized I'll be there soon enough.. See you then.

## See How \$46 Million In CPS Cuts Affect Your School

CHICAGO — Here's a school-by-school breakdown of the \$46 million in midyear cuts announced by Chicago Public Schools Monday.

The cuts were announced as a way to fill the hole in the CPS budget after Gov. Bruce Rauner vetoed \$215 million officials had been counting on, CPS said.

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Two point five million families were evicted in 2015, according to Redfin Residential, usually after an armed sheriff knocked and a pair of movers offered a grim choice: "Street or storage?" Passing the bedraggled belongings of families recently homeless, we might wonder how they got there. Harvard Professor Matthew Desmond employs his Wisconsin PhD to show us. Some people's hard lives are made even bleaker by the amount of time, money, energy and faith they expend trying to find, make habitable, and maintain the barest of roofs over their heads. *Evicted* is an unrelievedly painful study of the practical and legal machinery that roots out residents who are disturbed, disabled, drug-addicted, or simply down-on-their luck, in two segregated Milwaukee neighborhoods where Desmond lived for a year. Tenants there spend more than half their incomes for places that are as mean and miserable as the hovels of Les Mis---one a trailer park and the other where rental properties can be bought for \$5000. His intimacy, empathy and precision harken to other great books that make sociology readable: Nicole LeBlanc's Random Family, Isabel Wilkerson's Warmth of Other Sons, and Katherine Boo's Behind the Beautiful Forevers.

Evictees may have made bad choices, but Desmond argues they have precious few to begin with. Everything bad follows eviction: kids wander unsuccessfully from school to school;





adults have trouble keeping their jobs; everybody loses their few possessions; and having no address may cost public benefits.

Forever afterwards, they are forced to live "shoulder-toshoulder with drug dealers, sex offenders, and other lawbreakers" because they're kept out of better places. Desmond's two landlords didn't much screen their applicants and their renters didn't require much in the way of capital investment, creature comforts, or safety. Rents were higher than market. Tenants got behind. Lawyered-up landlords prevail over tenants who don't show up, or come without a way to explain to the court how they plan to satisfy their delinquencies and improve their financial situations. Like major banks that give credit and subprime mortgages to people who cannot afford them, and payday lenders who offer loans to people with lousy histories, Desmond's two landowners understand: "there is a business model at the bottom of every market" that makes some people very rich. Poverty as a symbiotic relationship between the haves and have-nots is no more starkly shown than by an eviction. Hard as it is to read, Evicted belongs on everybody's list.

Form into small local groups and communicate how your MoCs are performing with regard to specific issues of the Trump agenda.

Have groups attend every town hall or public meeting of your MoCs and demand answers. Be visible to the public and the press.

Make coordinated phone calls to MoC offices to voice concerns and opinions. If possible, have every member of the group call MoCs on the same day to express your stance on a particular issue.

Make group visits to MoC offices for meetings with MoCs or their representatives. Demand that you are granted a meeting, and make it public if you are refused.

Provide positive reinforcement and support to MoCs who are already doing what you want. Positive calls and visits to MoC offices are rare, and very much appreciated. Help embolden MoCs to stand up to Trump by letting them know they have your support.

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### What We Mean When We Talk About

**Tolerance** Lessons Found In A Metaphorical Pebble In Our Shoe By Mahjabeen Syed

The English language has always fascinated me. Growing up, I was fluent in both Hindi and English. Although Hindi has a delicate cadence all its own, I didn't find it to be quite as playful. There weren't countless synonyms to describe the precise state of one's happiness or a dozen ways to explain the warm earthy scent that rises from a lush open field recently lavished by rain. But I suppose everything has points of weakness. Not even language stays the same, since the meaning of certain words morph as we age.

Robin Williams is quoted as having said, "No matter what people tell you, words and ideas can change the world." Now more than ever, I believe that holds to be true. Although Barack Obama and Donald Trump are drastically different people, both were elected because of their promise and call for change. We remain divided at this time because of our own ideologies and those of our new president. Whether you support Trump's opinions and actions or not, we all strive to find peace in some form, but words like tolerance are what hold us back.

From the time we are children, we associate tolerance with a pain threshold. Tolerating the dull ache under our foot from a pebble in our shoe or, as teenagers, tolerating the long commute to school during inclement weather and then, as adults, tolerating others, their way of life and their beliefs. In every sense of the word, tolerance means coming to terms with something because we *have* to endure it, not because we want to. So when we say we need to have racial or religious tolerance, we are associating it with something uncomfortable, something we don't want to do—a metaphorical pebble in our shoe.

Tolerance is the equivalent of settling. The word might seem ordinary and harmless, maybe even positive because many parents and schools pride themselves on teaching it at home or in the classroom, but if the foundation is unstable, so is its message.

The fact is, the word itself is tainted. Tolerance does not apply to the majority, but is contextually fashioned to encompass only outsiders: those with religious backgrounds that differ from the majority, those whose sexual orientation is not deemed as "the norm," those who don't look like most of the people in mainstream media and so on.

As a Muslim-American who came of age in a post-9/11 America, I can tell you that the last thing someone like me who comes from a persecuted religion wants to hear is that my religion and my existence is merely *tolerated*. Telling anyone that they are tolerated is taking the easy way out because you have decided it isn't worth your time to learn about them yourself. There is no gray area when it comes to acceptance. Either you accept someone or you don't. We cannot attain the change we so desperately seek when the words we use are inconsistent with the message we are trying to convey.

I have read and heard hundreds and possibly thousands of negative things said about my religion, but I still don't think that the vast majority of people who voted for Trump are inherently racist and hateful, I think they are misinformed.

If you watched the first ten minutes of Saturday Night Live the day following Trump's inauguration, you would have heard host Aziz Ansari comment on whites who think brown people don't belong in America. "I think part of the problem is a lot of these people, they just haven't interacted with any brown people in their normal life. The only people they see are these monsters in the news who are just a drop in the ocean. Maybe what needs to happen is when they do the news report, they should do a second report about some other brown people that are just up to normal stuffjust to calm those people down."

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## Jahn-designed South Loop tower to break ground in 2018, says developer

Work on the planned 832-foot residential tower at 1000 S. Michigan is reportedly at least one year away

BY JAY KOZIARZ JAN 24, 2017, 1:09PM CST While this winter saw skyline-altering South Loop projects such as Rafael Viñoly's <u>One Grant Park</u> and HPA's <u>Essex on the Park</u> move forward, work on 1000M architect Helmut Jahn's 73-story residential tower—is reportedly at least one year away. The news comes from Robert Singer of developer Time Equities who recently told the <u>Chicago Tribune</u> that groundbreaking is anticipated to take place in 2018 with delivery targeted for 2021. New York-based Time Equities is co-developing the project with partner JK Equities.

Arguably the most high-profile South Loop project of the current crop of towers produced by downtown's building boom, the 832-foot proposal for the parking lot at 1000 S. Michigan was first revealed as a <u>bold and boxy super-tall</u> reaching 1001 feet skyward. The design was

subsequently shortened (and smoothed) following input from neighbors and elected officials and the issuance of <u>amended</u> <u>guidelines</u> for the Historic Michigan Avenue District from Chicago's Committee on Landmarks.

As skyscraper enthusiasts wait patiently for Jahn's 1000M to dig in, they can take solace in the Tribune's news that the 48-story residential tower down the street at <u>1326 S. Michigan</u> will start construction in the "next few



months." Designed by Solomon Cordwell Buenz, the 500unit rental project is rumored to be called "SoMi" tower. It comes from a development team comprised of Chicagobased Murphy Capital Management and CIM Group—the LA-based developer of Block37 and <u>new owner of Tribune</u> <u>Tower</u>.

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#### Johnson Publishing Building To Be Considered For Landmark Status Defender Editorial Team

Mayor Rahm Emanuel today announced Chicago's former Johnson Publishing Co. building on South Michigan Avenue will be considered for landmark status. The move will help protect and celebrate the 11-story building's iconic, International Style design and its decades-long affiliation with black business and culture.

"As we celebrate Black History Month, it is the perfect time to honor this building that stands tall as a decades-long epicenter of black history and culture," Mayor Emanuel said. "This designation will cement this building's status as a landmark that is not just part of the legacy of the city of Chicago, but the history of our nation."

The landmark designation process started today with a preliminary recommendation at the Feb. 2, 2017, meeting of the Commission on Chicago Landmarks.

"My father started Johnson Publishing Company to inform, empower and uplift the African American community," Linda Johnson Rice, Chairman of Johnson Publishing Company and Chairman Emeritus of Ebony Media Holdings said. "With my mother Eunice by his side, they built an iconic brand. I am thrilled that the building that housed our company for so many years is being considered for landmark status. It is a true testament to the hard work of my parents and all the people who called Johnson Publishing Company home for decades. I am grateful to Mayor Emanuel and Alderman King for supporting this effort." Completed at a cost of \$8 million in 1971, the building at 820 S. Michigan Ave. was constructed by Johnson Publishing Co. The company was founded in 1942 by John H. Johnson who, over the next six decades, grew the organization into the largest black-owned business in the nation. In 1982, Johnson became the first black man to appear on Forbes' list of 400 wealthiest Americans, and the Johnson Publishing building remains the only office structure in downtown Chicago built by an African American.

"I am immensely honored to champion the

landmark designation status of the Johnson Publishing company building, the first African-American constructed and owned building in downtown Chicago, located in the 4th Ward," Ald. Sophia King said. "As the alderman and longstanding fan of Johnson Publishing, it gives me great pride to support this designation which will allow the economic, social and cultural imprint of Johnson Publishing to be appropriately etched in Chicago's skyline and history."

Johnson used his company to celebrate achievement and success by black Americans, which was largely ignored or stereotyped by the mainstream media throughout the 20th century, according to a staff report by the Commission on Chicago Landmarks. Tapping into a huge demand for accurate and positive coverage of black life, his "Ebony" and "Jet" magazines became staples in black households across the country. Johnson's philanthropic work focused on education and, over his lifetime, he donated \$55 million (Continues on next page)

## Apartment high-rise for South Loop retail center looks to move forward

Plans to bring a tower component to the Shops at Roosevelt Collection appear to still be alive

Criticized sometimes for being too autocentric and suburban, the South Loop's Roosevelt Collection may finally get an infusion of urban de-



sign as plans for the project's long-discussed high-rise phase appear to be moving forward. A recent post on the online development-watching forum at <u>skyscraperpage.com</u> revealed a new rendering of such a building as well as information that prelimary bids for the project are expected to be forthcoming.

The existing mixed-use complex is currently home to over 300,000 square feet of retail space topped by 342 loft-style rental units plus a 16-screen cinema and utterly gargantuan 1,500-space parking garage. The aforementioned high-rise piece would occupy an empty notch set aside at the Roose-velt Collection's northwestern corner.

Developer Centrum Properties broke ground on the Roosevelt Collection project in 2007—then a combination of retail and condos—and reportedly spent \$350 million on construction. Struggling to find tenants, the development was sold to Dan McCaffery in 2011 for \$160 million. After finally leasing up, the property changed hands once again in 2015 when it sold to Prudential Real Estate Investors for \$225 million.

According to a 2015 <u>Crain's article</u> covering the sale, Prudential's acquisition also included accommodations for an apartment tower reaching as high as 43 stories. The newest rendering (above) shows a high-rise of roughly that stature and represents a much cleaner modern aesthetic compared to a somewhat cluttered design shown in older conceptual drawings (below).

The tower at RC isn't the only development looking to add more residential density to the neighborhood. To the west, the 29-story rental tower at 1000 S. Clark opened in early 2016 while the upcoming <u>33-story Alta Roosevelt</u> rental tower continues to climb skyward to the immediate north. With these and other projects like the <u>multi-phase River</u> <u>Line development</u> in the works, the timing and market conditions might at last be ideal for Roosevelt Collection to finally go vertical.

## **Bullet Tears Through South Loop Condo** Wall, Into Woman's Bed By Kelly Bauer | January 26,

CHICAGO — A bullet ripped through a South Loop woman's home Friday, going through her bed in the same spot where she sleeps.

Jennifer, who asked that her full name not be used out of safety concerns, was away when the gunfire came through a neighbor's condo and went through her wall, headboard and covers.

It wasn't until Jennifer returned home to the first block of East Ninth Street and went to her bedroom that she found the bullet in her sheets, she said.

Jennifer was shocked, fearful and "a little" hysterical, she said. She called 911, and officers investigated, she said, going to the condo of the neighbor who shares the wall the bullet came through.

An officer and building maintenance man told Jennifer the neighbor had tried to "haphazardly" cover the bullet hole in his wall with a picture frame, she said. She's never spoken to the man, Jennifer said, and she doesn't think her building has rules against tenants having guns.

The officers filed a report, saying the case was aggravated assault, Jennifer said, but later that night they returned and said the charge had been downgraded to criminal damage to property.

That's the last Jennifer has seen of any investigators, she said. She's called the police but said they told her they would not be sending out a detective to do any more work.

The circumstances of the gunfire were unknown, police told DNAinfo, but the case has not been closed.

"I still have to live next door to him and ... I don't feel safe in my own apartment," Jennifer said. "That's exactly where I sleep. It came through exactly head-level through my pillows. That's exactly where I sleep."

Jennifer has contacted a lawyer and has reached out to her building's property manager and board of directors. She's hoping she can get the board to investigate the incident and how tenants are screened.
