The South Loop Is About To Get A Mural-Filled Makeover

Hey South Loop: Get ready for a makeover. Columbia College is hosting a street art festival, and it's going to completely transform the Wabash Arts Corridor.

WABASH ARTS CORRIDOR

BIG WALLS

Dubbed the Wabash Arts Corridor Big Walls, the festival will bring in 18 artists from around the world to take the areas big walls—over 40,000 feet of them—from drab to fab over the course of two weeks.

And lest you worry that the district might plan to return its new walls to their original dull blankness: These murals are here to stay.

The festival will take place from May 1 to 13. By the time it's over, the number of public art installations in the arts corridor will reach almost 40, giving Chicago one of the largest concentrations of public art installations in any city center nationwide, according to the organizers.

"This is an incredible cultural district that no one has ever recognized," Columbia's Vice President for Student Success Mark Kelly told the Chiagoist. Kelly coined the term Wabash Arts Corridor as an idea to activate the street for Columbia's art students. "The Wabash Arts Corridor saw this transformation using street art and installations and media to bring the district to life, and then the idea itself would be a way to bring all of our neighbors together," he added.

Columbia College alumni and Chicago artists will be joined by artists from Brazil, South Africa, Argentina, the Netherlands and Italy. Among the Chicago-based cohort are well known graffiti artists such as Amuse 126, who's known for his elaborately colorful tags; Lady Lucx, who has transformed building sides nationwide into whimsical landscapes; and Czar Prz, whose intricate street art mixes

From the start, the Lucas Museum has been saddled by a huge public relations problem and it's getting worse Posted 5/3/16

No matter what side you're on in the Lucas Museum mess, one thing I know for sure: YOU and Friends of the Parks did not cause it.

Who did? Look no farther than Mr. Star Wars George Lucas and Mr. Mayor Tiny Dancer. It's their fault. Two guys who think they're smarter than everyone else.

And maybe they are. We haven't seen the end of this saga yet. No one knows how it's all going to end up.

Apparently, [Lucas learned nothing](#) from his hometown of San Francisco experience: that non-negotiable demands don't work. They threw him out and he came here. Knowing Tiny's reputation as a knuckle-rapping, leg-breaking, dead-fish-sending kind of guy, he figured his demand for lakefront land and to be an instant part of [our Museum Campus](#), with all the money and glory that comes with that designation would be a done deal. No questions asked. No press conference needed.

The ignoring of public relations created the problem of public relations.

What Mr. Star Wars and Mr. Tiny didn't remember was that actual people live here. And we sort of recoil at those who use surrogates to make their demands, while keeping mum themselves. And they also didn't foresee the commitment and foresight and smarts of Friends of the Parks, which put their money where their mouth was. And which got themselves [a fabulous lawyer](#).

Once in a great while we rise up--especially when it comes to outsiders. While we've had no problem being pushed around through the years, it's never been as outlandish and obvious as this deal: a modicum of dough, a blobby white building, 59 Norman Rockwells and a Star Wars memorabilia collection--in exchange for anything he wants, including verboten land. All because of the chance that maybe

people will come here and spend money on food and hotels. And [airbnbs](#).

We do have our limits.

Some people say Friends of the Parks--[which has momentarily suspended its lawsuit](#)--likes the idea of [getting rid of Lakeside Center](#) in exchange for a new "smaller" building on that footprint--and plenty of new park space. That they'll drop the lawsuit if that happens. And some say maybe they should go along with the original site--[if Lakeside Center gets leveled for a new park](#) of some sort.

I have no idea what Friends of the Parks is thinking. But I'm certain they don't want to keep their resources flowing toward legal bills any more than necessary. So maybe they'll negotiate this whole problem away.

However, I am pretty sure of one thing. If Tiny decides to raise [the enormous bundle of cash](#) he needs to tear down McCormick Place East, and relocate the convention space somewhere else, [another group is going to take the place of Friends of the Parks](#): Preservation Chicago. Preserving mid-century architecture is all the rage today--as well it should be--and the idea of getting rid of an iconic structure created by renowned architects in exchange for housing Star Wars memorabilia to appease George Lucas won't sit well.

Repurposing the building from the inside, ok! Taking the Michael Reese land off our hands, ok! Buying land in Lawndale or Bronzeville or any underused land in an underused area of the city, ok! Do that George and you are welcome.

But George and Tiny, take it from me, we do have our limits. And we've pretty much reached them.

Mutha's day



Well, we got through another Mothers Day. Not that there's anything wrong with mothers, mind you. Beth and I celebrated by riding our tandem bicycle to U.S Cellular Field to watch a White Sox win with our generous friends Don and Juli (seats to die for, btw). And at our son Gus' direction, I bought some very fragrant lilies and presented them to Beth on Gus' behalf. Which was all nice. It's just that the avalanche of sentimentality and tributes and bragging' on our moms can get a little cloying sometimes. And dare I say, dishonest? Maybe, a little? (And then there's the equal time thing—as our single friend Brad asked our single bartender Sean at Hackney's last night, "When's bachelor's day?")

On Mothers Day (and Fathers Day, of course), somehow the notion that some people had really awful mothers — that any mothers can be awful — gets lost. I know, I know, that shouldn't keep us from appreciating the "good" ones. But you know, I didn't see any pictures of Faye Dunaway as Joan Crawford in [Mommy Dearest](#) in my Facebook feed yesterday.

Plus, there just seems to be no room for ambiguity. Let me put it this way: to use a gender-neutral term, women can be assholes sometimes. Even the best of them. Ergo, mothers can be assholes.

I know mine could be. She could be abusive in her criticism of me and my sister. She had a crazy temper, and threw stuff at us. She could be defensive and insecure and combative to an extreme degree. She did everything she could to give me and my sister opportunities she didn't have, but at times couldn't hide her envy. And I will always love and admire her.

She was born to Italian immigrants. She grew up 40 miles from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, a row house that was in a town owned by the coal mining company her father worked for. Paolo—as I would observe as a child—was a relentless critic of his children, even in their adulthood. So my mom, Esther, came by it honestly. Nothing she did was good enough for him. And so it was for me and my sister.

She won forensics competitions in high school, and traveled all the way to California to compete. She was smart as a whip. And probably could've been anything. I

always thought a career in law would've suited her. Back then, though, the only option she had was state teachers' college.

No doubt in my mind it wasn't her first choice. But she did it. She started her career teaching Marines' kids at [Camp Lejeune](#) during the war. She endured tragedy with the loss of her first husband when my sister was only six months old.

She went on to be a fantastic teacher for decades. I know this because of the many parents who have told me so, and from the kids I went to high school with who'd had her in grade school. (Who also professed some wonder at how I survived being Mrs. K.'s son.)

During adolescence, I had some vicious battles with my mom. There were times when I hated her. And then, thanks in large part to who she was, I grew up and became a young man. With an analytical mind like hers. A sense of civic and social responsibility. A respect for the English language. A love of baseball. And an eternal suspicion of school administrators and gimmicks like charter schools and NCLB blah blah. And, yeah, sometimes with a temper like hers.

The very things that made me despise her in my high school years were the things I empathized with as a young adult. I could read her frustration with her lot in life, her ambiguous and simultaneous support and envy of her kids' opportunities, and the source of her insecurity. It's also clear to me now that she was prone to depression in an age where the idea of going to a shrink was unthinkable in her milieu. It wasn't always pretty, but she slogged through.

So, this year, in my world, Mothers Day will come again November 8. That's when I expect to celebrate one brilliant, flawed, confounding, tough-as-nails mother by voting for another one.

And if you don't do the same—don't tell me, or be prepared for a coffee cup to come whizzing by your head.

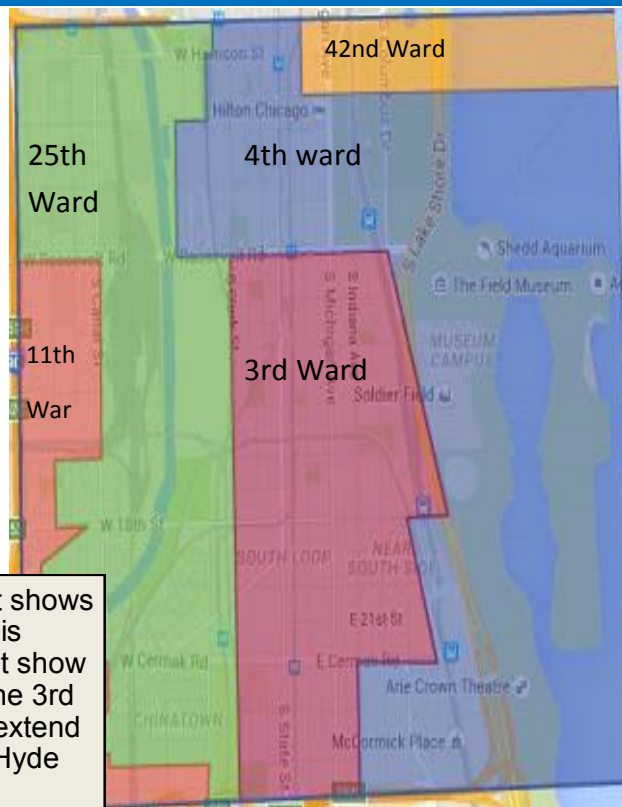
Notes from the first Civic Action meeting

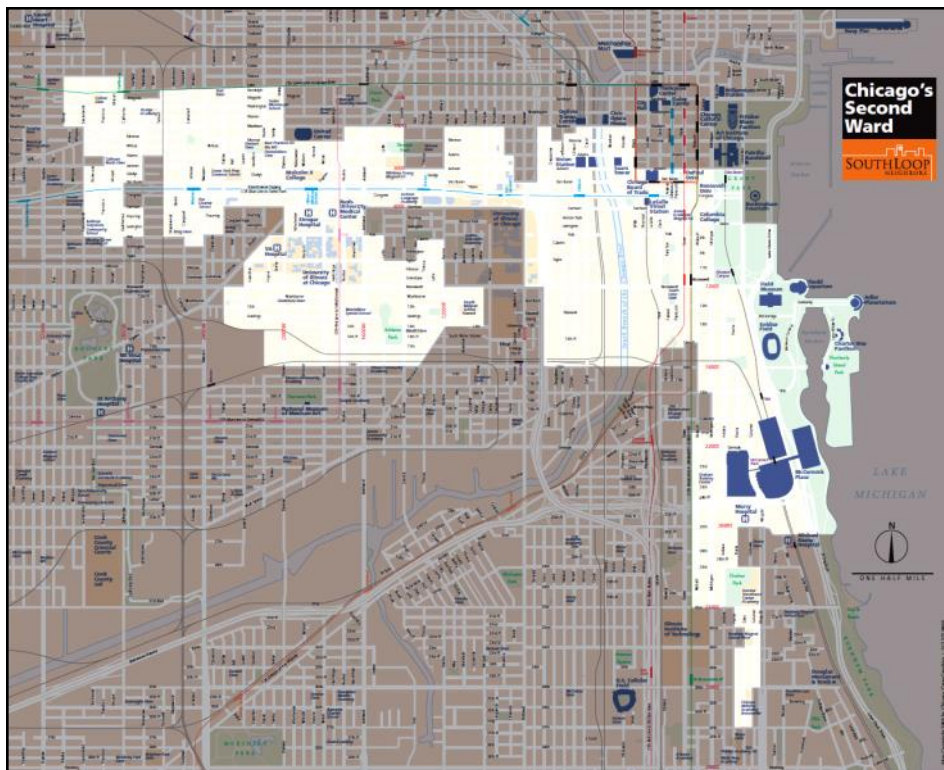

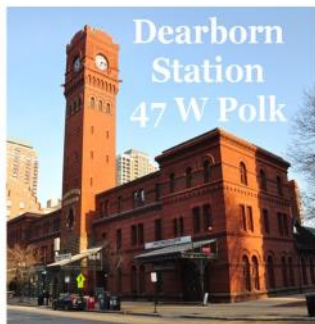

Amanda Eyre Ward
 The Same Sky
 (Ballentine 2015)

We all travel under the same sky, from Tegucigalpa to Toledo; Guatemala City to Galveston; even from impecunious Montopolis to affluent Barton Hills, radically different neighborhoods in Austin, Texas, where this story ends. But people and places--not the sky--make for the misery of migration or purely personal exile. We meet and visit them all in The Same Sky. It is pre-teen Carla's terrifying, page-turning, first-person narrative of her flight from poverty and violence in Honduras, searching for the mother who left two tiny kids and a grandma to find work in the US. It is the diary of disappointment recorded by Alice, living at the end of Carla's imagined rainbow but wrestling with her own crucible: childless and aging, seeking a raison d'être, overshadowed by a possibly-faithless husband whose barbecue restaurant garners national attention and sexy, visiting food critics. It is a glimpse into teenaged Evian's troubled life, with overwhelming problems from which she may not be able to escape --however short the distance.

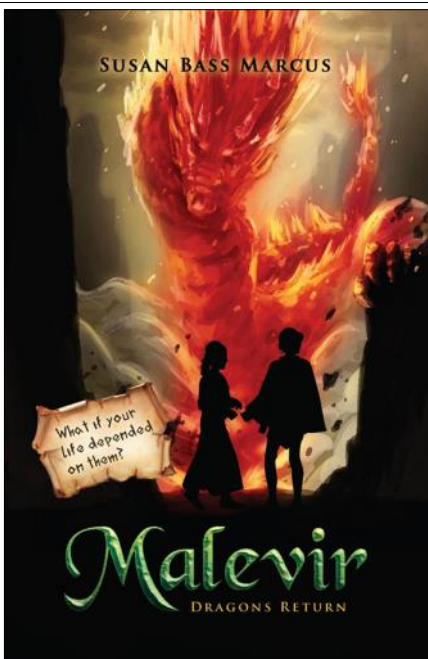
Sadly, Evian gets lost by Eyre-Ward's almost treacherously attempt to intertwine Carla and Alice, but her empathetic prose pulls us into the lives of all three as they make their trek across the geography of their troubles, and end up, briefly, at the same place and time. Chapters alternate

between Alice, with Evian crossing and fleeing her path, and Carla, whose dreams are deferred long after she completes her harrowing hejira. The three women populate Eyre-Ward's globe and rattle us with their unique pain. It's a good read, but mostly it is a passionate look at immigration, a topic as tragic and timely as it has ever been in history. Sixty-six thousand unaccompanied minors crossed our borders in 2014. We had almost half a million people in detention in 2015. This year, ten states argued in the US Supreme against President Obama's order of temporary amnesty, a social security card, a driver's license, and in-state tuition for almost 4 million undocumented people, most of them children. A wall against Mexico is part of the presidential-election vernacular, and domestic terrorist attacks heighten national security concerns. Globally, 250 million immigrants are on the move. It's tough to imagine the wars, gangs, terrorists, poverty, violence, natural disasters and climate change that force one to leave home and undertake a wildly dangerous journey. But Eyre-Ward puts us on one journey that can help us understand.

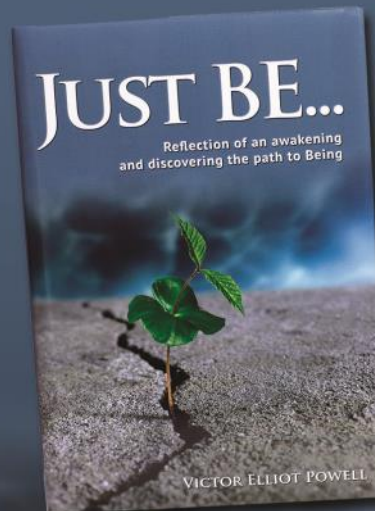

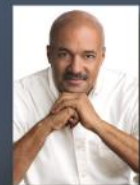

Safe & Sound Blog

Mike's [post last month about using Facebook to mourn](#) for Prince motivated me to ask the writers in the memoir classes I lead to write about a celebrity's death that made them really sad. "The celebrity can be an author, an artist, an athlete, a musician, an actor, an actress, a political figure, anyone who is famous and died," I told them, urging them to write about themselves and their circumstances. "If the person you're writing about is famous, your readers will already know about them," I said. What I was after in their essays was an idea of how old they were when that celebrity died, what was going on in their worlds at the time, why the loss was so significant to them and how they grieved.

My downtown class, the one with Wanda in it, is taking a few months off. Writers in my other three memoir classes came back with essays about Vidal Sassoon, Grace Kelly, Robert Kennedy, Martin Luther King, Princess Diana, Wiley Post, Will Rogers, Van Johnson, Mary Travers of "Peter, Paul and Mary."

Two of the younger writers wrote about the death of musician John Lennon. Michael admitted that John hadn't always been his favorite Beatle. "He seemed aloof, mean, and sarcastic." He wrote that the "seemingly cheerful Paul and George" were more his type until later on, when he realized the Beatle's songs he loved to play on his guitar were Lennon songs.

Lorraine fell in love with John Lennon the first time she saw him on TV. "I wouldn't say John and I were intimate," she wrote., "I was only 13." She confessed she never liked Yoko Ono. "I was jealous," she conceded, describing John Lennon's murder in 1980 like this. "He was walking down the street with Ono. Of course she didn't save him."

Kathy wrote about John Lennon, too, but she wasn't a teenager when she first laid eyes on him. "My lack of knowledge of pop culture is a monumental failing. But even I knew about The Beatles!" In 1980, Kathy was the mother of four and the volunteer Executive Director of the [Illinois Citizens for Handgun Control](#). "Our political action was sorely hampered by the small size and homogeneity of our membership," she wrote. "And then Mark Chapman pulled out a handgun and fired four bullets into the body of John Lennon." Chicago scheduled a memorial event eight days later at Lincoln Park's Cricket Hill.

The Illinois Citizens for Handgun Control created bumper stickers that said *Imagine a world*, along with an arrow pointing to the words *without handguns*, and volunteers handed out flyers with information on how to order a bumper sticker for a dollar. From Kathy's essay:

December 15 was clear and cold. 3000 Lennon mourners gathered for the program and the 10 minutes of silence that was observed around the world. We handed out our flyers as participants departed. In the days that followed, hundreds of orders with crumpled dollar bills arrived in my office.

Membership information accompanied the bumper stickers and a surprising number responded. Some of the respondents became the organization's most effective leaders. Diversified and energized, the Illinois Citizens for Handgun Control organized their first annual Walk Against Gun Violence in 1982 as an effort to educate people and encourage widespread advocacy efforts. "I think John Lennon would have approved of us," Kathy wrote.

In the end, more writers wrote about presidents than musicians. Most presidential essays were written about John F. Kennedy. One writer was in Paris when JFK died, another was supposed to celebrate her first wedding anniversary on November 22, 1963, and a writer who worked at *Life Magazine* accompanied a photographer to Arlington Cemetery in Washington, D.C. to cover the president's burial there. Another was in high school when he got the news. "When he died, everything slowed down," he wrote. "We watched on color TVs, some of us, but it all seemed to be in black and white."

Hugh said he was moved by the death of President Kennedy, "but I was an adult in my 30s then, and I understood what it was all about." He was only 13 when President Roosevelt died in 1945, however. "I had never dealt with the death of a famous person" he wrote. "For me, Roosevelt was THE PRESIDENT. He was first elected in the year I was born and went on to be elected for an unprecedented four terms. I knew who he was. I heard his distinctive voice on the radio and saw his big grin in newsreels."

Mary Lou was playing hopscotch with friends the day FDR died and knew something was wrong when she came home and found her mother at the front entrance of their Chicago two-flat. "We never used the front door unless company came," she wrote. "So I was very surprised when I saw Mommy at the front door of 4523, still wearing her apron and using it to pat her eyes."

Regan wrote about a president, too, but not one who died. She'd worked on Bill Clinton's campaign in 1992, and when he won, she relocated from Chicago to D.C. to work in his administration. "In 1994 he passed a crime bill I thought went too far. Next he signed NAFTA, an agreement opposed by every Democrat I respected," she wrote. "Dissatisfaction settled in the space between my bones and muscled me awake at 3 o'clock in the morning for the next seven years."

Regan turned on the radio in her DuPont Circle townhouse one morning in 1995 and learned Jerry Garcia had died overnight. "I collapsed on the bathroom floor weeping over the death of something I couldn't put words to. At 49-years-old my idealism had come to an end: my false world of everlasting good died with Jerry Garcia."

Regan started weeping again when her friend picked her up for work that day. From her essay:

Keith waited a few respectful minutes, and then, with one simple sentence, he opened a new, naked reality that included the unspoken caveat of don't take yourself too seriously.

He said, "well, it's not as if it's Aretha Franklin."

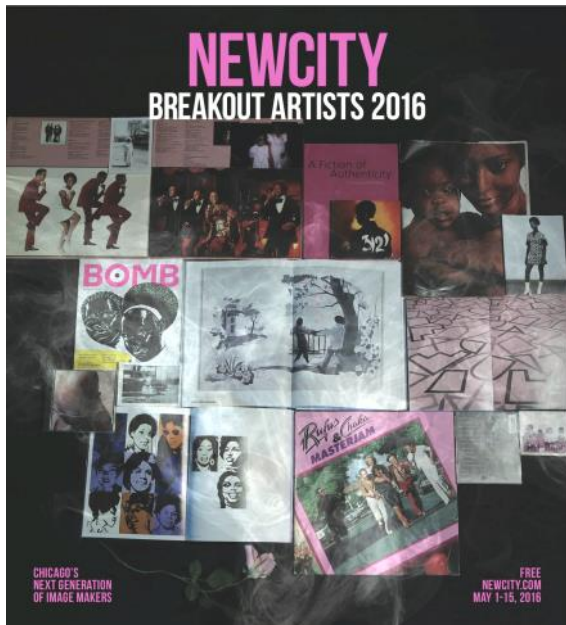

Breakout Artists is Newcity Art's annual shortlist of Chicago artists we think you should know. This is our thirteenth edition, and we're damn proud of it.

Chicago art ain't what it used to be, and for the most part, that's not a bad thing. Beyond the splashy stories about major museums landing massive gifts and charting ambitious expansions, a groundswell of energetic activity has primed the city for a major cultural renaissance. The steady expansion of Chicago's commercial gallery networks means more artists making a living off their work without decamping to the coasts. Indeed, the upcoming fifth anniversary of EXPO Chicago, our homegrown art fair, means more dealers, collectors and curators will be coming to our city to find new work. And it's not all commercial—alternative spaces that have stoked a steady fire beneath Chicago's creative crucible are celebrating double-digit anniversaries even as they inspire new spaces to pop up all over the city. Miraculously, Chicago's art community has stayed close to its roots in generosity and collaboration even as it witnesses this new wave of growth and global attention.

At the core of this hustle and bustle is the artist herself, and that's who we honor in this annual feature. Call them what you want—producers, makers, innovators, trendsetters, imaginaries—they do the hard work of making Chicago a more beautiful, more thoughtful and infinitely better place to call home. The artists featured here are not “emerging” in a typical sense. They are breaking out—from the boundaries hemming in media or identity, from many years of making their practice a priority despite the odds, from expectations about what art can be and how its presence makes new meaning in the world. Their practices span the gamut of media and they've shown work in the major institutions and the smallest basement galleries, sometimes

simultaneously—such is the Chicago spirit. What unites them is a deep commitment to their practices and the skillful excellence of their work.

I thank the writers who realized this issue with me, as well as the rest of the contributors to Newcity Art. As a freshmen editor nearing my first anniversary on the job, I am grateful for everything I have learned from working with such talented minds committed to honoring the creative capacity of Chicago in writing. 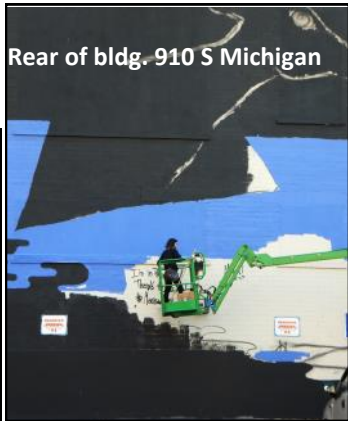

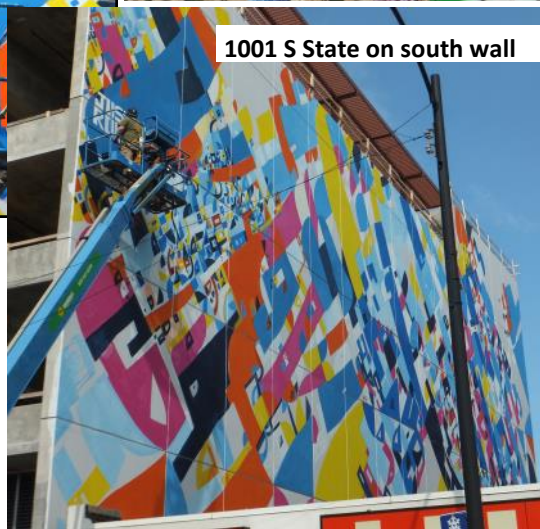

the bravado of graffiti with the meticulousness of comic book art. Most of the walls being put up for the Big Walls festival are not on Columbia's property. While the idea was born at the college, private entities in the community have also put their walls—some as tall as eight stories high—in the hands of street artists. Among the participants are the Roosevelt Hotel, the Helmut Jahn tower in the South Loop, and a new 40-story Kenwood Development

building that will open up this summer. "Street art is becoming a defining part of the urban landscape across the world, there's no question about it. ... the great pioneers in Chicago and street artists across the world remind us how bleak walls can look, and how with whimsy and magic and paint, they can be brought to life," Kelly said. The festival has a stacked lineup of artist talks, demos, and music, and it all culminates in Columbia's annual Manifest Urban Arts Festival on May 13. At that festival, events and exhibits will involve the entire campus, and will include image projections, sculptural objects, site-specific installations, kinetic sculptures, and even a "sacred sonic bubble wrap walk experience," according to Kelly. Outdoor gym proposed for Grant Park near Balbo and Columbus

Exercise, wellness, health education, and fitness opportunities on a large scale may be coming to Grant Park

through a new outdoor gym. With the working title The Health Space @ Grant Park, the new amenity would be a 36,000 square foot outdoor gym proposed by the Grant Park Conservancy (GPC), whose members feel the gym would serve as a very dominant reminder for Chicagoans and visitors to pursue a healthier lifestyle.

While there already are many exercise venues within the park, GPC members see The Health Space @ Grant Park becoming the most prominent. The gym would be open to all for free, with no fees for any of the services or use of the equipment, according to Bob O'Neill, president of the GPC. There also will be equipment for physically impaired individuals.

At a recent standing-room only meeting of the Grant Park Conservancy/Grant Park Advisory Council, a majority expressed support for the initiative.

Under the guidance of O'Neill, a committee has been formed to develop plans. Among this committee's members are individuals from Europe who are experts in reducing preventable health issues.

That is because Ross Arena, PhD, Professor and Head of the Department of Physical Therapy at the College of Applied Health Sciences at the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC) also is involved with the effort, and he is chair of the European Society of Preventive Medicine.

A South Loop resident, Omari Jinaki, who recently relocated from New York City is also involved in the planning as he is familiar with smaller versions of outdoor gyms in New York City parks.

"While we realize that the outdoor gym will not be used by everyone, we believe it will serve as an inspiration for health in this era of computers, television, and sedentary occupations," O'Neill said. "A great deal of attention is also being given to make it aesthetically pleasing and attractive to participants and non-participants alike."

O'Neill said, "All of the equipment for The Health Space @ Grant Park will fit into a more natural, sustainable setting so as to look very organic. This has not been done anywhere in the world at this level."

UIC involved trainers will be recruited to consult with gym participants, and graduate students of UIC pursuing advanced degrees in nutrition, kinesiology, and other health-related fields would also be involved, "raising the benefits of this outdoor gym initiative to an unprecedented level," O'Neill said. "It will provide a platform for local students and faculty invested in healthy lifestyles to interact with the community and significantly impact the health of Chicagoland citizens." **For the rest of the story:**

Student housing planned for vintage Loop office building

A pair of developers plan to convert a 117-year-old building near the Harold Washington Library into student housing, the second redevelopment of its kind on the block.

Justin Elliott, co-founder and former owner of Chicago Apartment Finders, is teaming up with LG Development on the project at the Plymouth Building, an 11-story office property at 417 S. Dearborn St. After buying the vacant building last month, the developers plan to turn it into a 30-unit, 140-bed housing complex catering to students at Columbia College, Roosevelt University and other schools nearby, Elliott said.

Completed in 1899, the Plymouth Building is just south of the Old Colony Building, another vintage office tower that was converted into a 380-bed student housing complex that opened last year. Chicago investor Sean Conlon **had the same idea** in mind for the Plymouth Building back in 2009, when he bought the property, but he never followed through on his plan.

Privately owned student housing has become **a popular real estate sector** with investors over the past decade or so, as millennials have reached their college years. Many investors also view the sector as an attractive alternative to office, retail and other property types, which tend to swing with the ups and downs of the economy.

“Student housing is a little more recession-proof than all those apartments that are going up,” said Elliott, president of Elliott Capital. “It’s steady. It’s always there. These students aren’t going anywhere.”

Chicago has a dozen or so student housing properties, ranging from the 1,720-bed University Center in the South Loop to **Automatic Lofts**, a 482-bed building in the West Loop that caters to students at the University of Illinois at Chicago.

Elliott declined to disclose how much his joint venture with LG, a Chicago-based residential developer, paid for the Plymouth Building, and the transaction has not yet been recorded with Cook County. But Elliott said the entire project will cost about \$11 million. He aims to fund some of the cost with historic tax credits. **For the rest of the story:**

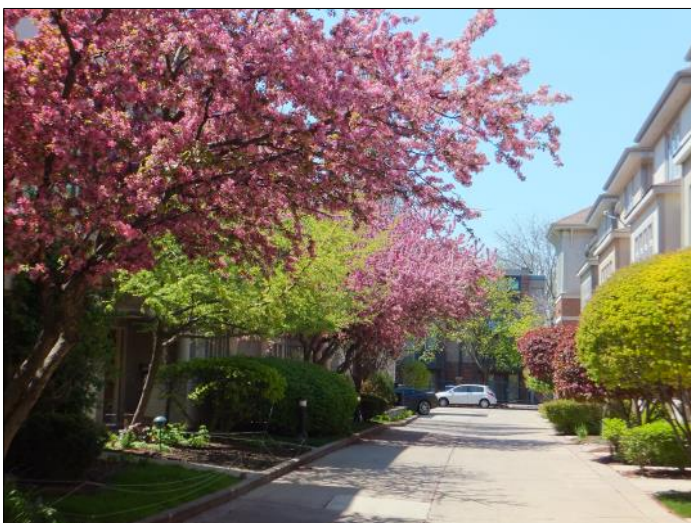

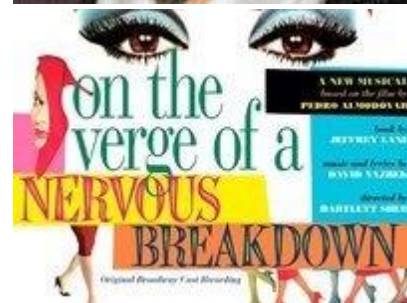

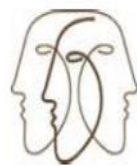

Stolen vehicle flees traffic stop, crashes in South Loop

Authorities investigate after a stolen vehicle drove away from a traffic stop and crashed into two other vehicles Wednesday night in the South Loop. | Network Video Productions

One man was injured in a South Loop crash late Wednesday after a stolen vehicle drove away from an Illinois State Police trooper who tried to pull it over.

The trooper attempted to initiate a traffic stop at Roosevelt and Canal after identifying the vehicle as stolen, but the vehicle drove off, according to Illinois State Police.

The vehicle then hit two other vehicles that were stopped at a red light a few blocks away at Roosevelt and Michigan at 11:55 p.m., according to Chicago Police.

The trooper drove up to the scene of the crash and saw two suspects running away, according to state police. A short foot pursuit ensued, but the suspects got away. A handgun was recovered from the stolen vehicle.

A man who was in one of the vehicles that was hit was taken to Northwestern Memorial Hospital, Chicago Police said. His exact age and condition were not immediately known early Thursday. No other
