

2 Proposed Buildings . . . One Packed House by Al Hippensteel

On Thursday, Oct. 29th, 2015, a meeting hosted by South Loop Planning Board and moderated by Alderman Will Burns, was held to allow the community to see details of the proposed buildings at 800 S. Michigan Ave. and 1000 S. Michigan Ave. The meeting, held at East West University auditorium, 816 S. Michigan Ave. drew many from the neighborhood, especially condo owners behind 800 S Michigan on Wabash and 910 S. Michigan, right next door to the Helmut Jahn 86 story project. As the President of the 910 S. Michigan Ave Condo Association expressed at the meeting, they always knew that some day, someone would build on that vacant lot next to them. The owners just didn't expect it to be so out of scale to their iconic building that was once the "Standard Oil" building. What puzzles many is that these proposed properties are part of the Michgan Avenue Wall Landmark District. They will first have to present their proposal to the Landmarks Commission. Dennis McClendon, Chicago Architecture Foundation docent and long time board member of South Loop Neighbors provided me with additional insight.

"...landmarks commission usually looks for design that's not pretending to be historic, but that is compatible in materials and massing with the surrounding buildings. ... When the tower at 830 S. Michigan came up in 2008, I went and testified, pointing to the massing provisions of the guidelines. The Michigan Avenue district was built at a time when zoning limited the main base of a building to 260 feet, and a much smaller tower (one-fourth the floorplate) could go to only 425 feet. One of the commissioners pointedly told me at the time that the guidelines hadn't explicitly adopted such bulk limits."

Other concerns focused on infrastructure. If all these projects of super highrise buildings are completed, will the city also have to plan on infrastructure improvements to accommodate denser population and more cars. During the busy summer event season, when Columbus Drive is closed, traffic creates grid-lock and stress on Michigan Ave. and State Street. As Blair Kamin states in his Oct 30, 2015 Chicago Tribune column, "Density alone is not the issue. The issue is how to make density livable." (Continued on page 9)

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At Northerly Island, why would people want to look at an artificial pond instead of a real lake? Tuesday 11/03/2015

Yesterday I finally got to the <u>new and improved</u> <u>Northerly Island</u>, one of our latest South Loop amenities. And I was shocked.

Not as shocked as I was the morning many years ago when I woke up and found out <u>Mayor Richie</u> <u>had ordered the carving up of the runways</u> and the outlawing of planes at Meigs Field--which preceded the new and improved Northerly Island by decades. This was done to clear the sky of planes on that part of the Lakefront, so as not to worry the FAA or break their rules about tall buildings in the vicinity of an airport. Richie's friends had been buying up all the land around Meigs for years--so they could build huge high-rises with which to rake in cash because <u>we were going to host the</u> <u>2016 Olympics</u>.

Remember that?

I was willing to accept the huge prairie that replaced the quaint little airport that politicians loved in order to get to Springfield fast; and that small town businessmen and their wives loved to park their private planes at in order to attend business meetings and shop at Marshall Field's, respectively.

The prairie with it's thin path surrounded by natural plantings was simple. And the huge empty vista from the city to the lake was unparalleled in Chicago. It gave me quite a feeling. Just like the first time I saw the city from <u>the original Sears</u> <u>Tower</u> on Homan Avenue on the west side. I'd never seen the city like that before.

But what we have now at Northerly Island is <u>like</u> an exhibit at <u>Disneyland</u>. Enormous reddish boulders reminiscent of Mars--as conceived in the blockbuster movie <u>"The Martian,"</u>--are piled up along the east side of the island like a fortress. On the other side of the boulders is Lake Michigan, the city's greatest natural resource. And the boulders totally block the view of the lake from the island. Unless one is a giant.

You know the lake is there. Why the designers of the this park decided to block the view is beyond me.



There is a huge concrete path that meanders around the island, surrounded by some sort of plantings that won't be ready for three to five years, and which are currently behind ugly temporary fencing. And in the middle of the island is an artificial pond, fed by the waters of the invisible Lake Michigan.

So much for natural. And so much for Lake Michigan. I guess the lake is out of style now that we have <u>Studio</u> <u>Gang</u>.

Postscript: Yesterday was my second attempt to visit Northerly Island since it opened several weeks ago. Security guards blocked the way of taxpayers who wanted to visit in early October because the well-paid-bythe-City-for circuses-<u>Redmoon-Theater</u> was cleaning up after they deliberately built and then burned down a house the night before to celebrate the Chicago Fire. It didn't fizzle this year <u>as it did on the Chicago River last</u> <u>year</u>, wasting the city's money--but it did send sparks toward Burnham Harbor, <u>damaging the masts of many</u> <u>sailboats, as well as the patio awning at the Burnham</u> <u>Park Yacht Club</u>.

Why not just celebrate what we accomplished after the 1871 conflagration in Chicago? Not the conflagration itself that killed hundreds, destroyed a city and left thousands homeless.

Mondays with Mike: A jazzy Veteran's Day story Published November 9, 2015 <u>Mike Knezovich</u> ,



As Beth and I settle in at home at day's end to decide what to do on any given evening, we can casually look at what's at the Jazz Showcase and saunter down the block to take in some marvelous music. And we have a Veteran to thank.

In 1944, the U.S. Air Force drafted **Joe Segal** and stationed him in Rantoul, Illinois, at the now-shuttered Chanute Air Force base—about 20 miles from Champaign-Urbana. One could only guess what that was like for the native Philadelphian.

Joe had been a jazz fan back in Philly, and upon his discharge, he moved to Chicago and enrolled at Roosevelt University on the G.I. Bill. He also joined the university jazz club, and in 1947 he began organizing live afternoon jazz shows showcases—on campus. He kept on keeping on for the next decade and began booking shows in dozens of locations across the city. He booked both local and national acts—like Charlie Parker.

Eventually he opened a club—<u>Jazz Showcase</u>—on Rush Street. Over the decades, neither lost leases nor changing tastes in music would stop Segal. The Showcase has moved multiple times since, and most fortuitously for Beth and me, the last move was to <u>Dearborn Station</u>, a long city block's walk from our place.

Which brings us back to the luxury of having it a short walk away. There's music seven nights a week. The marquee artists typically play Thursday through Sunday. Sunday includes an afternoon matinee that is kid-friendly—Joe says it's his part in saving them from pop music. Mondays through Wednesdays usually have a lower cover charge, and often feature local acts, and often the bands from Roosevelt or DePaul University.

Last Monday night, a posting for a show announced that Ira Antelis and Lee Musiker would present music recorded on a recent collaborative CD.

I'd never heard of either, and the ad said you had to have RSVP'd earlier to come. It was more of a private party. We sort of gave up but after a day of beautiful fall weather, we decided to take an evening stroll and dropped in to see who was playing on the next night. Joe's son Wayne, who now pretty much runs the joint, told us we were welcome to come in that very night, no charge.

I looked at Beth, we both shrugged our shoulders as if to say, "Why not?"

We found seats at the bar, and I noticed lots of folks that

looked like musicians filing in. And lots of well-heeled urbanites, also filtering in at a good pace. We were intrigued. Well, we learned that Antelis and Musiker (how does a musician get a name like that?) met in college in New York. As Antelis told it, Musiker's virtuosity on the piano convinced Antelis that he should give up pursuing a career as a pianist—he understood immediately he'd never be that good. And the rest is history.



Antelis went on to be a successful

composer and producer, doing lots of commercial work that you'd recognize. He runs a thriving studio called <u>Jira Produc-</u><u>tions</u> here in Chicago.

<u>Musiker's</u> still a pianist, but that hardly covers it. He's done a bunch of everything in jazz, classical, Broadway and pop stuff. He's been music director, arranger, and orchestrator, and the people he's worked with blew me away. Marilyn Horne, Wynton Marsalis, Joel Gray. He's been touring with Tony Bennett since 2001, and he plays with the New York Philharmonic.

And so, that's what Beth and I stumbled into, for free, on a Monday night. They performed the music from their recently released album, *Gone but Not: Du-al-ity*. The album features Antelis' compositions, and Musiker on solo piano. But the show we saw was arranged for a trio. And man. Joel Spencer on drums, Larry Gray on bass. Chicagoans will understand.

Antelis and Musiker would trade Vaudeville-esqe schtick about their history, and then the trio would proceed to blow the room away. Antelis didn't do much playing, he just listened to his stuff being performed wonderfully.

I really can't do it justice here. But there is one number, one I didn't expect to like, that I hope you'll listen to.

I'm not a big rap fan. I'm not a big spoken word fan. And I usually squirm when spoken word is combined with music—it can come off as fussy and forced.

But I gotta' tell you. Antelis took the piano, and knowing Kevin Coval was in the audience, he invited him on stage to perform the title number from the album, *Gone but Not*. Coval is a poet and the founder of "Louder than a Bomb," a fantastic poetry program for kids. That should be "youth program," but that's so sterile.

Please give a listen via this video, which also scrolls the lyrics. Beth and both found it moving. I can't recommend it enough.

In the meantime, here's to Joe Segal (who still's hanging at the club, introducing acts, and dissing pop music, by the way), one of my all-time favorite veterans. Thanks Joe.

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
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Book Review for Dearborn Express

Listening to the <u>Voices from Chernobyl</u>, (Picador 2005) one of the few English translations of journalist Svetlana Alexeivich's work, it's clear why she won the 2016 Nobel Prize for Literature. These are the personal stories of the worst nuclear disaster since we bombed Hiroshima and Nagasaki, when 140,000 died from blasts, burns, and radiation. The 1986 accident at the Chernobyl nuclear plant in the Ukraine unleashed 400 times more radioactive material than the atomic bomb dropped in 1945. It took 5 days for radiation to encircle the globe. Despite early official accounts that things were under control, Pravda eventually reported up to a 100,000 deaths since the explosion. Unsurprisingly, US military and media were similarly sanguine and dissembling after Hiroshima.

When the press is at risk everywhere, when polar ice caps melt in Greenland so we are exploring clean energy, and when even the Pope pleads for an honest conversation about what we are doing to our common home, we sorely need a way of getting to the bottom of things: especially when human folly collides with inevitable forces of nature. Alexeivich helps us remember the sins of the past. She gives us voices without imposing her own perspective. We learn nothing about the speakers except their names and how they observed the catastrophe: wife of a dead firefighter; re-settler; scientist; party official; resident; historian. And they speak powerfully. A newlywed, who clings to her irradiated husband dying from the blast,

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
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begins: "I don't know what I should talk about---about death, or love, or are they the same?" A refugee from another post–Soviet war opines: "Death is more just than anything in the world." A soldier recruited to clean up said Chernobyl was "like a smack to the head....I turned in my Party Card. I became free." A resident argues: "The apples are hanging in the garden, the leaves are on the trees, the potatoes are in the field. I don't think there was any Chernobyl...."A re-




settler moved to Chernobyl because: "No one will kick us off this land. It's not anyone's...God took it back." It may be many years until we really know the fallout from Chernobyl; but at least we can learn how the feelings of those upon whom it first fell. Painful and unsettling, it's a book we all should read.

My friend Lynn LaPlante Allaway's daughter Lucy started pre-school this year, and whoa, has Lynn taken advantage of the free time! In the past few months, Lynn has

- finished the rough draft of a novel she's been working on
- started her own <u>Backwards and in High Heals</u> <u>blog</u>, and
- been asked to write regularly for the *Huffington Post*

All this while she and her husband Mike herd their four (yes, four) active children to school and various activities in-between her rehearsals and performances as principal violist with the <u>Chicago Jazz Philharmonic</u> (CJP).

You might recognize the Chicago Jazz Philharmonic's name. The orchestra's director Orbert Davis happened to be in Havana coaching music students there when Raul Castro announced the thaw in relations between the United States and Cuba. Davis and those students were <u>featured in a 60 Minutes story</u> <u>last December</u>, and in a *Chicago Tribune* story this week jazz critic Howard Reich says that when that historic announcement was made on television last year, the young Cuban musicians Davis was working with cheered and the percussion section jumped into a rumba. More from this week's <u>Chicago Tribune</u> and the percussion section jumped into a rumba.

Throughout the rehearsals and the performance, Davis was bowled over by what his Cuban charges achieved. "When presented with every challenge in jazz, the students rose to the challenge," he says. "Especially the two monsters, which are swing and improvisation. They nailed it."

Those Havana music students arrive here in Chicago today to spend a week preparing for a <u>concert with</u> <u>the Chicago Jazz Philharmonic this Friday, Novem-</u> <u>ber 13</u>, and reporters from *60 Minutes* ar here, too, to follow them from rehearsals to visits to Chicago landmarks like Millennium Park and Navy Pier. "It's going to be a little time warp for them, especially to see modern cars for the first time, to see the Willis Tower, which is three or four times taller than the tallest building in Cuba," Davis told the *Chicago Tribune*.

My friend Lynn is in the middle of all this, and you can read her take on it in a <u>piece she wrote</u> for <u>Huffington Post Chicago</u> earlier this month. <u>Tickets are still available for this Friday's</u> <u>concert</u> at the Auditorium Theatre, but if you can't make it to Chicago, I'm guessing the segment about these young musicians from Cuba will air next week, November 15, 2015 on *60 Minutes*.


I've heard the Chicago Jazz Philharmonic live many times before and was thrilled to watch 60 *Minutes* last December when Orbert Davis was in Cuba. My heart sunk, though, when the show pointed out that sanctions had forced these young Cuban sax and clarinet players to use reeds that were 30 or 40 years old. My hope is that when I listen in on the 60 *Minutes* segment next week, I'll hear that the new relationship between Cuba and the U.S. means these young musicians can bring new reeds across the border for their friends back home!

CHICAGO (CBS) — A

construction worker was killed in a job site accident Friday morning in the South Loop. The man was working on the fourth floor of a 50story condominium project



under construction in the 900 block of South Sate Street.

The Fire Department said the man was in the garage area, working with high-pressure air – perhaps a steam pipe – when a device malfunctioned, and exploded in his face. The worker suffered massive head injuries, and was killed instantly.

The Cook County Medical Examiner's office has confirmed the fatality.

The primary contractor at the work site is Walsh Construction, but it was unclear if the worker was an employee of Walsh or a subcontractor.





I was able to get my hands on a rendering for 837-39 S Wells. It was done by SPACE Architects + Planners, but I couldn't find anything additional on their site. It is being developed by Michigan Avenue Real Estate Group and built by Vivify Construction. It looks like the concrete foundation work is near complete for the north side of the development. It will be rental at first and will likely convert to condos in a few years. It will be 84, mostly 2BDR, units with 2 small commercial bays on the first floor. Garage entry will be on Financial street.

A reader writes: Dear Alderman Dowell,

As multi-year residents and now new homeowners in the area known as the South Loop (roughly Congress to Cermak and the lakefront to the river), we've noted with interest the huge new wave of residential construction now underway all around us. At least 2,000 new residential units have recently been completed or are about to be, with close to another 5,000 on the drawing boards, all within a half-mile of our home. While there are certainly challenges inherent in such a burst of new development we view it as on balance another positive step for the neighborhood and indeed the entire city.

There is however one particular issue which is both a great opportunity for the city and, if not addressed soon, a serious threat to the growth and development of the South Loop. We are now among many parents of young children in the neighborhood who would very much like to have our preschooler join the Chicago Public School system.

I'm sure you'll agree that it would be great for the health of CPS, and in turn of the city as a whole, to have a fresh influx of public-school enrollment from a diverse and rapidlygrowing middle-class neighborhood. And it's important to note that while much of the newest South Loop development is being designed for singles and childless couples, some of those folks (and we are again an example) will fall in love with the area and become highly interested in staying here to raise children.

The huge overcrowding at the South Loop School is obvious evidence of both the need and the potential benefit to CPS of responding to that need. And the nearest CPS neighborhood high school is several miles away, so we are surrounded by CPS parents who once their child reaches 9th grade are reluctantly deciding on either a private school or the suburbs for high school. What an opportunity the city is losing! There are two key things the city needs to do in order to retain and nurture the South Loop's growing and diverse base of middle-class taxpayers:

• Build a second K-8 public school in the area.

• Convert the old Jones school at Harrison/State into a neighborhood public high school.

Each of these steps is critical. Your making this issue an urgent priority would be hugely beneficial for the South Loop, for the Chicago Public School system, and indeed for the entire city that we love.

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

CHICAGO (WLS) --

Chicago police are warning people walking the **Chinatown area** late at night after four violent robberies in the past week The rain didn't keep some walkers from getting around Saturday, but along South Wells Street last weekend Chicago police investigated two robberies and then they say the attackers struck again later in the week.

Four robberies took place, all in the Chinatown area between last Sunday and Friday.

On October 25, there were two robbery attacks, one on South Stewart Avenue, the other in the 2000-block of South Wells Street.

The other two happened a few days later in the 200-block of West Cullerton and in the 1900-block of South Wells.

"I am surprised, it's a very nice block," said Rose Bazan. "It seems very peaceful, everybody kind of watches out for everyone else."

"Most of the nights I can see a police car patrolling right here, even the park," Shaojie Zhang said. "So I think it's pretty safe." One thing the robberies on South Wells Street, Cullerton and South Stewart have in common is the attackers. Police say the descriptions are similar - three people, possibly two men and a woman, who sneak up from behind, hit their victim and demand valuables.

Each of the robberies happened after 11 p.m. at night, one incident at nearly 4:30 a.m. Chicago police say the best way to combat crime like this is to be aware of your surroundings.

Road Rage

There was an incident at Roosevelt Rd and State St on Thursday, Oct 22nd at approximately 5:45pm. A dark colored Lincoln cut off a bicyclist at the traffic light. He then reached out his drivers side window and snatched off her glasses and threw them to the ground. He then sped off. Passing pedesterians and the mortorist behind her found her broken glasses and called the police. Several witnesses wrote down the licence plate number of the perpetrator before he drove away.
