The new Lucas Museum plan looks like my Apple router with a cocktail coaster on it

A <u>Chinese architect who seems like quite a lovely man</u> came up with the idea of <u>a white plastic mountain</u> for the George Lucas museum, the museum that Tiny Dancer wants to be not only on the Chicago lakefront, but also <u>the fourth museum of Chicago's famous Museum Campus</u>. This is what you might call dumbing down to the max.

Lucas says his museum will contain 59 Norman Rockewells and his Star Wars memorabilia collection.

My daughter Molly and I saw the Star Wars collection several years ago when it was ensconced at the Museum of Science and Industry for several months. The day we went we were the only visitors in the large exhibit. It wasn't exactly overrun with people curious about Star Wars. I will admit, though, that we went on a weekday when crowds are smaller.

Truthfully, I wouldn't mind seeing 59 Norman Rock-wells all in one place. But I would rather the one place be the Art Institute of Chicago. George, why not donate some dollars to the Art Institute, one of the greatest art museums in the world which is already up and running for 122 years--and ask that they devote a room to your Rockwell collection? Just like they did with Arthur Rubloff's paperweight collection.

Rockwells and Star Wars do not under any circumstances deserve to be ensconced in a fourth Museum Campus institution. Nor do they merit lakefront land. Or any land donated by the city. Lucas is a billionaire, and if he wants a museum, he should buy his own land.

I don't think 59 Norman Rockwells and Star Wars stuff is akin to the collections contained at the Shedd Aquarium, the Adler Planetarium and the Field Museum of Natural History--all three of which contain some of the finest museum collections on earth. Collections that define human existence. And the history of the world. R2-D2 they aren't.

Those three institutions also conduct cutting edge research on the campus and throughout the world. Compared to these three museums, the proposed Lucas Museum is positively ridiculous.

<u>Friends of the Parks</u> is ready to file suit the minute this thing becomes a done deal. They will waste their much needed resources. The City of Chicago will have to defend itself to the tune of big bucks spent on outside law firms--and will waste our city's much needed cash.



The new Lucas Museum plan looked very familiar to me when it was unveiled a few days ago-mainly because it looks just like my Apple router with a cocktail coaster on top. Not that I ever put a cocktail coaster on top of my Apple router.

If the Lucas Museum does come to be a part of the Museum Campus, it will become Chicago's responsibility-and eligible for all the support the other museums at the Campus receive. Which is totally unfair. Changes to the traffic infrastructure around Lucas' ego-building museum would also be our problem and our responsibility. The Lucas Museum is undeserving of any help from taxpayers. We don't need these headaches and these expenses, Chicago. San Francisco put its foot down and said "No!" to Lucas after four years of screwing around. Why is it Chicago's destiny to screw around with him now?

Please, George Lucas, go out and buy a nice big piece of land in Chicago. There's a lot around. Don't ask us for handouts. Don't bother us with lawsuits and architectural renderings that look like Apple routers with cocktail coasters on top. And don't push us into providing new traffic plans that inconvenience us. Leave us alone. Build your museum, run it--and let the people come to see your Rockwells and your Chewbaccas and your Jabbas. On your dime.

And may the force be with you....







Quiz show

11/20/14

Last Thursday I spoke to a U of I class in Champaign. Monday morning I spoke with second graders at Chicago's Francis Xavier Warde School. Yesterday I spoke to visually-impaired adults at Blind Service Association.

Each of these three presentations ended with a Q&A, which lead's me to today's quiz. Tell me if the following questions came from a college kid, a second-grader, or an adult with a visual impairment:

How do you know what you're wearing?

How does it feel to be blind?

What is the name of your book?

What's your favorite thing to do with your dog?

What is it like to be blind?

When you're up there in front of us, do you picture what we look like?

Do you know my girlfriend?

So is there one thing that's happened since you've been blind that you just can't picture, you know, like instagram, or, like something like that?

Is it sad to be blind?

That's the quiz, now for the answers – let's see how you did.

A college girl asked this. I was wearing black shoes, black jeans, a gold sweater and a colorful scarf. The shoestrings on my black shoes feel different than the shoestrings on my gym shoes. I put a safety pin on the tag of my clothes that are black, and the gold sweater is the only one I own that has a cowl neck (so I just memorize that the one with the cowl neck is gold). My multi-colored scarf is the only one I own that has textured stripes I can feel, and the woman who sold it to me said it'd go with anything. "Does it?" I asked the class. They chorused a yes.

A second-grader asked this one. I've been blind half my life now, I told her. "I know it's hard to believe, but it usually just seems normal."

A visually-impaired adult asked this. My talk was about memoir writing, so gee, you'd think I might have mentioned the name of my book, huh! I'd forgotten, though, and when I told

him my memoir is called Long Time, No See, he said he knew my story sounded familiar. "I read the audio version!"

The college talk I gave was to an animal sciences class, so you'd think this question would have come from a student there. But no, it came from a very cute second-grader. I'd never been asked this before, and I needed to take a few seconds to think before answering. "You probably guess I'll say playing fetch with a ball, or having her chase a Frisbee," I said. "But really, my favorite thing to do with Whitney is have her lead me to a place downtown, you know, get there by ourselves." I explained how good it makes me feel to have confidence in my Seeing Eye dog.

Another second-grader asked this question after I'd answered it the first time. She was no dummy: she didn't buy my first answer! This time I admitted that being blind can be frustrating. "It can take longer to do certain things," I conceded. "And I always have to remind myself to slow down so I won't fumble around so much." They seemed to like that fumble word.

A college kid asked this, and I told them the last time I was able to see was 30 years ago. "So I picture you all dressed like college kids in the 80s." They gasped, and then they laughed.

An adult with a visual impairment asked this. "She's from Champaign," he said. And know what? I do know her.

A guy in the college class asked this one. There are tons of things I can't picture, but the one that stands out is 911. "The plane going into the building, the smoke, the people jumping," I said, explaining that I went up in the Sears Tower and the Hancock Building in Chicago when I could still see. I remember how little the cars looked from up there, and how slowly they seemed to be travelling on the highways below. "But I just can't picture how little the people who were trapped on top of those towers looked, or what it was like to see them jumping off the buildings, all of that." It felt shameful to be intrigued by such a gruesome event, but I try to be honest when answering questions people ask at the presentations I give. I didn't want the students to try to describe 911 to me - heck, they were only 6 or 7 years old when it happened. "Lots of people have tried explaining it all to me already, I've read books and articles, listened to TV shows and documentaries about that day," I told them. . "I just can't get it into my head."


This same question about my feelings came from yet another second-grader. At Francis Xavier Warde School the students spend a lot of their year in second grade learning about special needs, and I think these second graders were worried about me. "You'd think being blind might make me sad, or maybe lonely, but it really isn't that bad," I assured them, explaining some of the benefits of being blind. "One of them is that I can't judge people by what they look like -- I get to judge people by what they say, and what they do." Judging from the concern those little kids showed about my feelings Monday, the second -graders at Francis Xavier Warde School in Chicago are beautiful.




SOUTH LOOP — Most people only notice typefaces when they're failing to do their job, according to Meg Duguid, director of Columbia's A+D Gallery, which will launch an exhibition this week that celebrates fonts. Typeface is an important part of the messages people absorb every day, Duguid said, either because they succeed in "allowing us to immediately grasp something and understand our place in the world" — or they don't.

"It's important on the actual, practical level of like, capital I's not looking like L's, a true practical, readable level," she said. "Type designers do a really great service to the world by making things clear, and also on some level, establishing mood and aesthetic."

Sometimes the stakes are high. Duguid points to several new signs Downtown that have recently left Chicagoans frenzied over fonts, like the giant, shiny serif "TRUMP" on Trump Tower, or the recent Esurance billboard that may have placed the "c" and "l" too close together in the word "click." "People are implicitly aware of how much type impacts their lives, and they become kind of explicitly aware when and where a type doesn't do its job," she said. "It doesn't either match the moment, or

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the thing that it's trying to express, or it's in some cases unreadable. And I think that's when people kind of get jerked out of their lack of awareness of how ubiquitous type is."

Duguid says it's not just graphic designers and visual artists who are put off by imperfect typefaces. <u>Hatred of comic sans</u>, for example, extends far outside the type design community.

"When things don't match up right — that's an angst that people can relate to," she said. "If you're looking at representing the future, you wouldn't use an old English type. You would use maybe something sans serif with hard edges."

TYPES by Display running at the South Loop gallery from Wednesday to Dec. 13, was curated by Jamilee Polson Lacy. The touring exhibition is site-specific, and is re-created at each gallery using a rubric designed by artist Katherine Walker.

The A+D Gallery exhibition works with materials from Chicago writer <u>Claire Keys</u>' stories that revolve around untranslatable foreign words.

"The words being utilized are words that can't be translated into English, so type becomes almost the bearer of that information in this case," Duguid said.
"I think people will leave the exhibit with a certain kind of hyperawareness," she said.

The A+D Gallery is at 619 S. Wabash Ave. and open from noon-5 p.m. Tuesdays-Saturdays and until 7 p.m. on Thursdays

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The church was designated a National Historic Landmark in 2013. Guides will be on hand before the performance to provide short tours of this extraordinary space.



CMK Cos. Acquires Lot South of River City Complex Which Points to a New Residential Development Along the River


In case you missed this last week, Crain's has an article about local developer CMK aquiring a lot on the Chicago river:

With one South Loop condominium development under construction, CMK Cos. may have another one in the works on a riverside site next to the River City complex. The Chicago residential developer agreed to pay \$4.9 million for a 1.8-acre site just south of River City, the Bertrand Goldberg-designed condo building at 800 S. Wells St., according to a recent filing in U.S. Bankruptcy Court in Chicago. CMK will be the preferred, or stalking horse, bidder in a court-supervised auction of the property Dec. 2, according to the document.

The developer specializes in moderately priced condos, completing a 714-unit tower at 235 W. Van Buren St. a few years ago and recently launching a 140-unit project at 1345 S. Wabash Ave. CMK also plans a 307-unit apartment development at 1333 S. Wabash.

It's unclear whether CMK plans apartments or condos on the riverside property. CMK President Colin Kihnke did not respond to requests for comment.

One observer said condos make more sense, mainly because thousands of apartments already are under construction in downtown Chicago.



"I think it's more of a condo site because there are more than enough apartments being built right now," said Thad Wong, co-founder of Chicago brokerage @properties. "There are very few entry-level condos being built."



What Does One Do With a Degree in Comedy? Columbia Grad About to Find Out

SOUTH LOOP — Willy J. Sasso makes me laugh, which you could say is a testament to the effectiveness of his recently acquired bachelor's degree in, well, the funny arts and sciences.

That's not a joke.

Last year, Columbia College Chicago teamed with The Second City Theatre to become the only college in the country to offer a four-year degree in comedy-writing and performance.

Sasso and his classmates made history as America's first comedy college graduates when they got their diplomas last spring.

I know you might be wondering exactly what kind of work a guy (or gal) with a bachelor's in comedy expects to get after college.

Willy Sasso says growing up near Columbine High School in Colorado shaped much of his dark humor:

While that question brings to mind obvious jobs that double as punchlines — barista, bartender and weed dealer, among others — I can say with all seriousness that Sasso believes his education in "making people laugh" has prepared him to make comedy a legitimate vocation with real earning potential.

Even before graduation, Sasso started sprinting toward his dream job as a performer, writer and director by teaming with his childhood pal, Drew Byerly, to produce a feature-length dark comedy called "Found Footage."

The Littleton, Colorado, native sent me a copy of the "no-budget" independent film that satirically takes aim at how the media portrays school bullies and mass shooters.

"I grew up about 10 minutes away from Columbine, and it was a big part of my growing-up experience," Sasso said. "This was our attempt to satirically present how the media portrays mass shootings and that all kids who presumably get bullied [are caused to] act out in violent ways."


"Found Footage" is shot in the shaky style of "The Blair Witch Project" with all the cringe-worthy moments you'd expect from an uncensored sketch comedy bit at The Second City. Sasso and Byerly dive into what they hope is their future by mining from the awkward experiences of young adulthood.

"Drew is my partner in crime. I love acting. He loves directing. That's how we became best friends," Sasso said. "In high

school we made an awful sitcom called "Drew and Bill." When I look at it now, it makes me cringe to think that we might have thought [the

"Found Footage" centers on three high school friends who "feel bullied" and come up with a flawed plan to round up their tormentors (and some "hot girls"), and lock them together in a warehouse packed with weapons in hopes they'll kill each other while hidden cameras roll.

"I think a lot of what we did was find our comedic voice, and you can see mine and Drew's humor in the film," Sasso said. "For the most part it's a tribute to the found footage and cheesy horror genre of movies that we're not really fond of. The irony is we're making fun of cheesy found footage horror movies by making a cheesy found footage horror movie."


Sasso, 22, said he's hoping to get "Found Footage" distributed online and accepted into film festivals by next year.

"We've had some test screenings, and people seem to like it," he said. "We don't see it as something we did to show people that we can make a movie. I think the film is good and I'm hoping to find a way so people can watch it and enjoy."

Sasso says he's already heard from a producer interested in their work. He's enrolled at <u>The Second City Conservatory</u>, and he's working on a one-man show set to take the tiny stage at <u>Davenport's Piano Bar</u> in Wicker Park this winter.

And to do that, he's making ends meet by working one of those jobs that some people might think double as a punch line — and no, he's not selling weed.

"I went to school to be funny because that's exactly what I want to do, but I'm also a server at <u>Flo and Santos</u> in the South Loop," he said, "A guy's gotta pay rent and eat, and there's nothing funny about a homeless comedian begging for food. ... Or is there?"




