



## Plumber's family sues for fatal South Loop constrution accident

The family of a plumber killed at a South Loop construction site last fall has filed a wrongful death lawsuit against the site's management company.

Joseph Middona, 38, was performing a pressure test on a water system on the fourth floor of a tower at 1001 S. State St. when a pipe exploded and struck him in the face about 9:50 a.m. Oct. 23, 2015, according to the suit filed Friday by his widow, Miranda Middona.

Middona was killed instantly, authorities said at the time. He was a resident of Elburn, about 55 miles west of Chicago.

The suit claims Walsh Construction should have had better safety guard in place at its worksite. It seeks more than \$150,000 in damages. A company representative could not immediately be reached for comment Friday.

Middona is survived by his wife and three young children, the suit says.



# Are scores of murals adorning buildings in the South Loop giving the neighborhood a new identity?

To hear **Norman Alexandroff** explain it, the South Loop has spent the last 35 years without a neighborhood identity.

Alexandroff is director of external and internal partnerships at <u>Columbia College</u>, whose campus runs through the neighborhood--and he is the man responsible for the infusion of <u>30-plus murals that pepper buildings</u> everywhere from the south end of the Loop to the farther reaches beyond Congress, from Michigan Avenue to points slightly west.

Most of the murals are done by solid artists from all around the world, many who started as graffiti artists. Many command large fees for their work.

Some are done by students.

Some artists have painted their work directly onto the walls of well-regarded and highly visible buildings-sometimes battling the elements, and feeling their effects for days or weeks until the work is done.

Some of the murals have been hung on a building instead of painted on for one reason or another. Some of the murals are photographs. Some are semihidden in alleys. Some have artificial lighting that allows attention to be bestowed on them past dark.

Some are abstract; some representational. Some colorful; some drab; some gorgeous. Some attract more attention than others. Some are of animals doing odd things like blowing a bubblegum bubble. One is of birds that are going extinct. One is of horses with no eyes.

Hardly any have a base political message. The building owners, who kick in money (Columbia acts as a pass-though/fiduciary) for lifts, artists' commissions and art materials to adorn their real estate don't want that.

The murals have a life-span determined by forces no one can do anything about. From new buildings that cover them up--to atmospheric conditions that wash them out in spite of weather resistant materials.

There is also the necessity of changing them up from time to time to give other artists' work a show-case. Although Alexandroff is constantly identifying new buildings--sometimes salivating over the prospect of big blank walls--and new landlords with whom to make a deal. Sometimes he thinks he has a live one--a landlord who likes the idea



and willing to kick in cash for the adornment. But then the communication breaks down and the building walls remain artless.

People have become so emotionally attached to some of the murals that change causes heartache--and the desire (or demand?) for a lost mural to be recreated close by, according to Alexandroff.

Rarely do taggers tag the murals. "Because they are from the same milieu and they respect each other," he says.

Sometimes the murals have extra special touches-like an underwater scene on a wall beneath a building
swimming pool. And sometimes artists change their
esthetic to one degree or another once on the lift doing their job; perhaps a visual angle doesn't work
properly from the street with the idea at hand. So
there are adaptations.

Some of the murals <u>have become news hubs</u> because they illustrate something that suddenly becomes newsworthy. The TV cameras converge to explain how this or that mural has an artistic message that parallels the news. The mural becomes famous.


And that, too, adds to a South Loop identity.





When I edited an alt-weekly in Champaign-Urbana lo these many years ago, I watched city council meetings on cable—I'd attend particularly important ones, but cable was a godsend. It allowed me to stay home, and go grab a sandwich, and from time to time, curse. There was a lot of malarkey, to be sure, but you know—Urbana and Champaign city council members spent a lot of time on that job. And mostly, they were sincere and operated in good faith.

Working that newspaper job taught me a lot about the value of local, or as it's now called, community journalism. And how bad it is that local papers have been replaced by really weak attempts like DNA info, Chicagoist, you name it.

That job at the alt-weekly also taught me how important local politics is, and what a meaningful impact citizens can make when they get involved. That starts with paying attention and voting.

## Two Hospitalized After Loop High-Rise Fire, Officials Say

DOWNTOWN — Two people were sent to hospitals on life support Monday afternoon following a garbage fire in a Loop highrise, firefighters said.



The fire department reported the fire at 2:42 p.m. Monday at 618 S. Wabash Ave. The garbage fire started on the seventh floor of the eight-story building, firefighters said.

One person was taken to Northwestern Memorial Hospital on basic life support and another was taken to Mercy Hospital on advanced life support, the firefighters said. Fire department spokesmen could not immediately provide the victims' conditions but said they were "stable."

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## Book Review: Thelma and Louise, with Children

Heroes of the Frontier (Alfred A. Knopf 2016) is not Dave Eggers' best. His memoir about being 21 and raising his little brother after their parents died deservedly made him a finalist for a Pulitzer Prize. His reporter's views of Sudanese boy soldiers or Syrian Samaritans during Hurricane Katrina are breathtaking. But this confusing novel about a disaffected dentist flying with her two small children to Alaska, to rent and drive and live in an overpriced, dangerous old RV in search of "a plain-spoken and linear existence centered around work and trees and sky" is mostly a bore. Like her spiritual grandpa Henry David Thoreau--who fled the soulless pressures of teaching at Harvard and "lived alone, in the woods, a mile from any neighbor, in a house which I had built myself, on the shore of Walden Pond, in Concord, Massachusetts, and earned my living by the labor of my hands only"---the reader senses that the protagonist is just shantying for the nonce in the vast wilderness and free reign that is Alaska.

The weirdly-named "Josie," disappears from someone who is inexplicably father to her two children, a ne'er-do-well she tolerated until he left her and married another women. Eggers and his extolling (all-male) reviewers pretend

Josie is the new, post-sexist hero; they made me read this book.

But Josie's just another woman scorned, who slips away, babes in tow, creating Amber Alerts across two countries and eluding detection by living a cash existence. It helps that, as a former one-percenter, Josie has a prodigious amount of cash. I was unconvinced by Eggers' taxonomy of personal motivators for Josie's risky picaresque. So, she was sued for malpractice and had murderous junkies for parents? It happens. There are too few of the most authentic bits about what Eggers knows: the perplexities and euphoria of single-parenting while drinking, or driving, or experimenting with life.


The book ends with small miracles of growth and hope for each blest family member. The antisocial and possibly ill 3-year-old begins feeding the poor and caring for younger children; the 8-year-old with the superego of a guilty young seminarian does something so self-caring it seems he's read "Co-dependent No More." Dr. Quijote understands she's


been just crazy enough and finds the light: "Her children, stripped of all possessions, were throwing stones into the river." Then they got naked, jumped in, and cozied around the campfire. Please.

#### Describe yourself in 150 words or less.

A creator of alternative worlds, from childhood on, I've explored many ways of expressing my imagination, including the visual arts, performance, and art education. Whether entertaining my younger siblings with shadow puppet stories (a babysitting strategy that distracted them from squabbling) during my adolescence, doing the same with my own children, performing

with my puppet theater, or spinning archaeology into an accessible and interesting subject, I've been telling stories throughout my life. Since leaving a long career as a museum professional, I have found great satisfaction in writing fiction, and turning out blog pieces about the creative process and its outcomes, which I publish on my website <a href="https://www.malevir.com">www.malevir.com</a> and on Goodreads.

### Which do you enjoy most—character or plot development?


My characters drive the plot. I enjoy watching them unfold and reveal their inner life to me. Sometimes the narrative gracefully falls in place because a character surprises me with some action or response that I didn't anticipate when I sketched the plot.

#### Tell us about your published works.

Malevir: Dragons Return is my first published novel, in the fantasy genre. I aimed it at both a middle-school audience (little violence and no sex) and adult fantasy fiction fans. Publishing the book was quite an education. My editor helped a lot at the time I was preparing the manuscript, but the real lessons sank in months after publication, and affect the way I approach my writing now. I am about 100 pages into the sequel, working title: Where Dragons Follow, and I must say the second book is tighter, the story arc is like a rainbow, and the characters have a depth not explored in the first work.

## Wednesday with Wanda: She's 95 today Published October 19, 2016

If you've followed our Safe & Sound blog for a while, you know who Wanda Bridgeforth is: she has been attending the memoir-writing class I lead in downtown Chicago for a decade now. She's witty and talented, and today is her 95th birthday!

When Wanda was growing up on the South Side of Chicago, her mother worked "in private family," which meant mama lived at the houses she took care of. Wanda lived with one relative one week, a friend the next, and sometimes, with complete strangers.

Wanda was tickled by the idea of us publishing one of her essays here in honor of her 95th birthday, and she suggested one that opens on Election Day in a small town she lived in just south of Chicago city limits in the early 1940s.

# Election – Village Style by Wanda Bridgeforth

Election Day was always eventful, but this one was extra special. Our 80 year old grandmother was "going to the voting" for the first time, a privilege she did not have in her home state of Mississippi.

Her Sunday suit and blouse were pressed, Enna Jettick shoes polished, bosom ruffle starched and ironed, white gloves washed and placed beside her, hat and purse on the hall table.

The second important event of the day? Mr. C. J. Berry had announced this would be his last campaign. He had been in office for many years and now wanted time to go fishing.

He was a very tall, very lean man whose arms and hands always dangled below his sleeves. He walked with a slow determined step. All the young people said he looked like Ichabod Crane from Sleepy Hollow.

Elections in our village were truly democratic. There were no appointed officials. All candidates had to go through the election process, even if there was only one name on the ballot. If a candidate did not receive a majority of yes votes, he lost the election and the search would be on for a new candidate. However, in all of my years of residency I don't recall a losing candidate.

The ballot box was mayor's the front porch in the summer and on his enclosed back porch in winter. The volunteer election judges worked in three-hour shifts during the hours the polls were open. The polls closed at 6 p.m., and by 7:00 or 7:30 we had our results.




Wanda way back at her 90th birthday party with her fellow writers in our Renaissance Court class.

When the day ended we had two big things to celebrate: Grandma's entry into the voting world, and Mr. C. J. Berry's pre-retirement re-election as Village Dogcatcher.

Beth here: Wanda never misses an election, and she told me once that every time she casts a ballot, she thinks of the day her impeccably-dressed grandmother voted for the first time. The memoir-writing class she's in is called "Me, Myself and I" and meets on Wednesdays. We'll all be together to celebrate her birthday in class today, and we'll all be together the day after voting day next month, too. However that election turns out, there's one thing you can count on: Wanda will be sporting a "I voted" sticker to class on November 9, 2016. Happy 95th, Wanda!





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## Film 50 2016 Chicago's Screen Gems

"Chicago, Chicago, I'll show you around, I love it Bet your bottom dollar you'll lose the blues in Chicago..." Fred Fisher, 1922.

Who are these people? Why, your friends and neighbors, strangers and dreamers, all building a story behind closed eyes, again and again, perfecting its proportions in mind's eye, then realizing its shape across weeks and months, and finally showcasing its finished form underground, above ground and all around town. (And on NBC, Netflix, Amazon Prime and screens of all sizes and proportions.)

We've shaken up this year's roster, its fourth incarnation, devoted to artists rather than producers, programmers and allround facilitators. There are dozens more who could be on this list, equally prodigious multi-hyphenate talents, mingling multiple careers, and we salute their focus, determination, craft and vision, too. We salute everyone with initiatives still gestating, scripts still being written, budgets and production plans still inching forward, accumulating ideas and images and apparitions and true life. Those hearts beat, too. This city- this region- is so rich. Support the work. Encourage the potential. Chicago is a city of neighborhoods, but also a community of bright minds and indelible hope and so many narratives we can embrace, recognize ourselves in, or discover ways to transform our imperfect but elementally great city. The greatest American city. Chicago Fire? Chicago "Exorcist"? Chicago P.D.? Naah. Chicago, Chicago.



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## Trucks/Cranes Move In to Start Construction on 24 Story High-rise at $1136\ S.\ Wabash\ {\it published\ Friday,\ October\ 7,\ 2016}$

A reader writes:

Any idea what is going on just north of Five Guys on Wabash? They have that crappy parking lot all fenced off and this morning had a ton of activity - big trucks and cranes.

Another condo building perhaps?

Indeed! This is going to be another apartment building.



As you may recall, we posted about this plan back in March of 2015. But yesterday, Curbed Chicago posted some new news:

The South Loop neighborhood is about to get another big tower project. At 26-stories tall, the new tower for 1136 S. Wabash Ave. is not going to be breaking any height records, but with 320 units, 9,000 square feet of retail, and 143 spaces for vehicle parking, it's quite a dense development. Initially proposed as a 24-story, 280-unit building, it now appears that Keith Giles, the project's developer, is looking to max out the total units and height allowed for the site. The city issued new construction permits for the project yesterday which will allow the developer to build out the tower's foundation.

We also saw the huge trucks and cranes from the El, so it appears this guy is happening.

The Curbed article also brings up an interesting point:

It should also be noted that the site is also the location of one of the better known Flyboy murals from famed local artist and muralist Hebru Brantley. Judging by the elevations and renderings for the project, it is highly likely that the podium base of the new building will



block the popular mural.



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# Chicago's Old Post Office scores first major renovation permit

The hulking riverfront structure is finally getting some attention after years of neglect BY IAY KOZIARZ OCT 6, 2016,



The first piece of 601W Companies' planned \$500 million overhaul of the long-vacant Old Chicago Post Office is falling into place with the issuance of a new building permit for exterior facade repair and restoration. While there's still a virtual mountain of work ahead in order to reverse years of decay and numerous fires, the news is an encouraging sign that the 2.5 million-square-foot Art Deco behemoth is finally getting some much-needed TLC.

Teaming up with the architects at Gensler, 601W will convert the Old Post Office into new office space with a rooftop deck and a riverfront plaza. The New York-based developer acquired the propertyfrom absentee owner Bill Davies for \$130 million <a href="mailto:earlier this year">earlier this year</a>. In an unusual twist of fate, Davies—who promised <a href="mailto:year">year</a> big things for the riverfront site but delivered absolutely zero—suddenly passed away in the middle of the deal.

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



## South Loop's Latest Student Housing Block tops Out


"And that's all she wrote," a construction foreman may or may not have said recently, as the apartment block at 30 East Balbo Avenue in the South Loop topped out.







Create an internal e-mail distribution system. This would be a separate email address any resident could use to send out emergency safety information to the residents of the building. A committee member would keep track of the emails and use the information gathered to report concerns to your district's police officers. Residents would have a choice to sign up for the emails.

Establish a building website and bulletin boards in common areas. This would assist in disseminating information quickly and efficiently to the residents of your building.

Appoint a person to post notices of safety committee meetings and CAPS meetings. In addition, the person would be responsible for posting updates as to events of such meetings.

Appoint a person or persons to attend CAPS meetings and other community or neighborhood meetings. Again, this is an information gathering function to keep your residents informed of events in your neighborhood.

Appoint a person to be "community liaison." This person's primary duty would be to establish communication with other buildings in your district. This could be accomplished through assisting with the establishment of a safety committee or contact with the management companies or condo boards for other buildings in your district.

#### E. Why does this work?

Everyone in your building is concerned about their safety. A safety committee would provide a means to address resident's concerns through a division of labor and time commitment. For example, only 1 member of the safety committee would need to attend the monthly CAPS meetings or neighborhood meetings, reducing the time commitment on the building and those on the safety committee. The safety committee can establish the above techniques to efficiently and effectively forward any important information to its building's residents. Further, if residents would rather remain anonymous and are afraid to report crime in the area, a safety committee can address this issue. Residents can be instructed to contact a member or certain members of the safety committee with any issues. The safety committee can then relay any information to the police officers in your district. The resident then can remain anonymous, but still have his or her concerns addressed.



## DOES YOUR BUILDING NEED TO ADOPT A SAFETY COMMITTEE?

## A. Does your building's residents have safety concerns which need to be addressed?

Every building and neighborhood in the City of Chicago has some type of safety concerns as an inevitable result of living in a large city. It is difficult for a condo board or management company to address such concerns in a random matter as they develop. In addition, the residents of your building often do not have time to attend meetings where they can gain important information regarding the events in the neighborhood and learn who can help address their concerns

#### B. How can residents' concerns be addressed?

The condominium board, property management company or other entity may choose to implement a safety committee. This committee would consist of a building's residents who are willing to volunteer some time to the ultimate goal of facilitating communication between your building and your district's police officers to ensure your building's safety issues are addressed.

#### C. What functions does the safety committee perform?

The committee's main function will be to act as a liaison between the building residents and the police officers in your district. The safety committee will be responsible for primary contact with the police and ensure that resident's concerns are addressed. In addition, a safety committee may choose to also liaison between the building residents and your alderman or establish communication with other buildings in your district to alert neighborhood residents of safety issues quickly and efficiently.

#### D. How does this work?

The safety committee's goal will be to gather as much information as possible from their building's residents regarding safety issues and use resources already available to address the issues. The safety committee may choose to adopt the following recommendations:

Appoint a person to be the "police liaison." This person's primary duty would be to gather information regarding resident's concerns, issues and incidents and establish communication with one or two main police officers in your district. The police liaison would also be responsible for following up to verify the police officers have adequate information and that residents' concerns have been addressed.

Appoint a person to be the "alderman liaison." This person's primary duty would be to work directly with your ward's alderman to make sure resources are employed to solve any safety issues in your district. (CONTINUED ON PAGE 21)
