Fioretti Running for Mayor: 'Chicago Needs a Change'

CHICAGO — Alderman Bob Fioretti announced his candidacy for mayor Saturday, saying Mayor Rahm Emanuel is divisive and "letting us all down," and outlining a platform focused on education, crime and the economy.

Over 150 community members gathered inside the East West University gymnasium Saturday morning to applaud Fioretti, the 2 nd Ward alderman, as he officially announced plans to challenge Emanuel. "We need one Chicago, not two. And to get there, we need a leader who will focus on bringing everyone together to deliver results that improve the lives of every Chicago family," Fioretti said Saturday morning.

"I pledge to be that leader. To listen to the broad coalition that is represented here today. To work with you, not against you. To be an advocate not just for the businesses in the Loop, but for the parts of the city that are too often ignored, where crime is a part of daily life, where there aren't enough jobs," he said. He touted his connections to the city, from his Italian immigrant father and Polish-American mother, to his blue-collar roots. Fioretti laid out a platform focused on improving education, crime and the economy during his first speech after announcing his candidacy.

"I have served two terms in the Chicago City Council, under two different mayors. I have rolled up my sleeves and have dug into the legislative process, all the while working to be a voice of reason," he said. "Our current mayor promised so much, and like many of us, I hoped he would deliver. But our schools are being gutted, our streets are not safer and so many are missing out on economic opportunities and jobs."

He received the biggest applause for his stance on raising minimum wage to \$15 and hour and instituting a 1 percent tax for commuters, which he said take a total of \$30 billion in annual income to the suburbs.



Where oh where have all the mailboxes gone in my South Loop neighborhood?

Where have all my <u>South Loop neighborhood</u> mailboxes gone?

On a recent Sunday night I went out with a bunch of mail to mail in the neighborhood and to get a little air. I walked from Roosevelt and State, up Plymouth Court to the mailbox at 1115 South. But the box was gone. Funny, I thought, they must be replacing it for some reason. The same thing I thought when the mailbox at 9th and State disappeared a while back.



So I continued a bit north to the next one I know--at Polk and Dearborn. But it was also gone. As was the next. And the next. And the ones after that. Until I had nowhere else to go but the heart of downtown. There are absolutely no familiar mailboxes left in Dearborn Park, Printers Row or on South Michigan Avenue--from Roosevelt to Congress.

What the heck is going on? There's <u>no Nato Summit here</u> or anything.

A friend who was skeptical of my story--and could have sworn she saw one on the 700 block of South Dearborn quite recently--went and checked. And much to her surprise, I was right. It was gone. She asked a friend if he knew what happened to our neighborhood mailboxes. And he told her he'd heard they were being sabotaged so they were removed.

Is that true?? Sabotaged? In our quiet little city enclave? What exactly does that mean?

Or could this be a cost-cotting measure instituted by USPS wherein they are no longer obligated to pick up mail in our neighborhood?



As you might have heard, there are big changes coming to the 2nd Ward office. As I announced this week, I will not be running for reelection as 2nd Ward alderman, although I hope to continue to represent you in the coming years.

I want to reassure you that between now and May 2015, when the new municipal

term begins, our ward office will continue to run smoothly and prioritize your needs above all else.

A few other quick updates:

At last week's City Council meeting, my Progressive Caucus colleagues and I introduced a resolution calling for truly universal affordable childcare and early education. You can read all about it here.

I'm deeply troubled by the news reports that CPS has <u>privatized</u> <u>janitorial services</u>, leading to filthy conditions in our children's schools. Now, the private company is now planning to lay off nearly 500 custodians, which will surely make conditions even worse. I urge CPS to take immediate action to rectify this situation. The health of our kids, faculty and staff is at risk--and that's unacceptable.

Some aldermen introduced an ordinance that will drastically change the way the Inspector General's oversight over aldermen works. I chose not to sign on as a sponsor, because I'm concerned that this ordinance does not do enough to prevent corruption and mismanagement within City Hall. I look forward to working with my colleagues to strengthen the ordinance in the weeks to come.






detective who put him away all those years ago.

Drama and happiness

Yesterday Whitney and I enjoyed a magical morning in a classroom in one of the most impoverished neighborhoods of Chicago's South Side: the Auburn-Gresham neighborhood. Fourth, fifth and sixth graders in a Montessori program at Oglesby Elementary are writing essays for a book they'll publish in November, and their teacher asked me to come talk about memoir-writing.

The kids and I had to talk about other stuff first, though. Like what it's like to be blind, whether I can blink or not, does my dog sleep with me in my bed, how I play piano if I can't see the keys, how come I open my eyes at all if I can't see. Then a thoughtful fifth-grader asked, "Do your eyes hurt?" Such a sweet, caring question. "I can't see anything," I said. "But no, my eyes don't hurt at all."

That answer prompted a question I'd never been asked before. "Can you cry?" For a quick moment I considered explaining what tear ducts are, telling the kids how they work, but then I thought about Jamal, a sixth-grade boy in class who'd described the memorial t-shirt he was wearing -- it had photos of a cousin who'd died on it. Another boy in class told me he gets angry sometimes because his father is in prison. I kept my answer simple. "Yes, I can cry" I said. "And sometimes, I do."

Jamal describes his memorial t-shirt for me.

I pictured the kids nodding their heads, understanding. The class was still for a moment, but then a boy in back broke the silence. "Would you win in a staring contest?" We all had fun with that -- his question led to a heavy discussion of staring-contest rules. Do you have to look right into someone's eyes, what if you're close but not looking right in their eyes, is it just all about who blinks first?

After the Q&A came the writing exercise. We all took a minute to write a few sentences that define our lives, then we

read our sentences out loud. I learned that Jamal is new to the Montessori class, but his little sister Shamiya has been at Oglesby Montessori for years. Jamal wrote: "I seen too much drama in my life. I wish I



had a dog for a best friend and happiness." A fifth-grade girl wrote this: "I'm oldest. One brother, 1 sister. Mom raised. Grandma died. Auntie baby died when came out. Happy that I am happy."

We went through an editing process to cut our stories down to six words, then to three words. The fifth-grade girl decided on "I'm oldest. Happy." A boy in class ended up with "I am awesome." Jamal's three words were downright poetic: "Drama and happiness."

The classroom teacher had asked me to come up with a writing prompt for the kids to work on after Whitney and I went home, so I told them to finally cut their piece down to one word. "That one word is your writing prompt for today," I said, and as Whitney and I left to go home, they all squirreled away to start writing on their topics. The kids promised they'll read their stories out loud if Whitney and I return to Oglesby Montesorri, so among other topics, I can look forward to hearing essays about:


Getting down to one word.



A teacher-aide told me later that Jamal settled on "drama" as his one word, but then found that topic difficult to write about with all his classmates there in the room with him. "I asked if he thought he could work on writing his memoir at home, and he said he thought he could," the teacher aide said, adding that she'd suggested maybe he could write about something happy while he was still there at school. "He and I thought he could write about what it has been like to experience Montessori class as a new kid."

A 501(c)3 not-for-profit organization called <u>Oglesby Montessori</u> <u>Foundation</u> supports and advocates for the Montessori program Whitney and I visited yesterday. The Foundation is looking for help funding chess and yoga classes and camping trips to Wisconsin, the Nature's Classroom Institute, and Camp MacLean. Please <u>consider donating</u>.







Art 50 2014: Chicago's Artists' Artists

If you've spent any amount of time observing or participating in visual art in Chicago, you know it's more community oriented and inclusive than competitive or exclusive. In Chicago, everybody's in, and no one is out. That said, Newcity publishes this ranked list of influential artists every other year in order to celebrate the accomplishments of a few people who work hard and smart, and who happen to call Chicago their home. The Art 50 also serves as a primer for newcomers—know these names and their practices and you can start to understand Chicago art pretty quick. This year we rotated out a bunch of artists who made the pick in 2012. This doesn't mean we don't care for their artwork anymore; we just wanted to open up the list for more voices to be heard. 1 Theaster Gates

Few artists have promised as much as Theaster Gates, so expectations are continually high. Simultaneously occupying and moving between the ninety-nine percent and the one percent, Gates' Rebuild Foundation has projects in St. Louis, Chicago and Omaha, and Gates himself has built an international profile with demand for his work reaching a high point in 2013 with a Pinault Collection commission. Locally, the Currency Exchange Café in Washington Park is now open, and major plans for the 95th Street CTA terminal and The Stony Island Arts Bank are underway. Skepticism of Gates may abound, but he's changing the city more, and faster, than many other socially engaged artists have ever done.

2 Michelle Grabner

Michelle Grabner is an artist, writer, teacher and curator-at-large. She co-founded both the artist-run project space The Suburban and the idyllic nonprofit contemporary art venue Poor Farm, and admits that she prefers organizing exhibitions in these casual contexts over ones that are "properly institutional." Like, for example, the 2014 Whitney Biennial, which she co-curated. The experience left her disillusioned about the state of art criticism (she called the practice a "blood sport" in the Huffington Post.) She writes via email, "It still troubles me that there was so much work that went unaddressed because critics and journalists instead kept their attention focused on the politics of the exhibition as if they were new problems. I understand that it is always easier and more inflammatory to wrestle with the structural problems of the biennial. But it really was troubling that more artwork wasn't critically parsed." She's featured in the (so-hot-right-now) Soho House collection, will hang a solo exhibition at James Cohan Gallery (NYC) next month, and has another solo show at the Indianapolis Museum of Art in May 2015. When asked how she responds to the criticism that she wears too many hats, she deftly replies, "You learn quickly that that is the rant of jealousy or desire... Comments like those tell you more about the source than the quality of your contributions."

3 Chris Ware

Graphic novelist, comic book artist and cartoonist Chris Ware (who found his humble beginnings within this very publication) works at the vanguard of visual storytelling, and is a hero of the commix resurgence. In 2012, he produced to great critical acclaim the ephemeral "Building Stories," a non-book book. In a review of the work, the New York Times called Ware "remarkably deft at balancing the demands of fine art, where sentimentality is an error, and those of storytelling, where emotion is everything." (When asked for comment, the famously self-deprecating Ware said he agreed with the observation but considers himself more daft then deft). He's collaborated with Ira Glass on a multitude of projects including "This American Life." His illustrations are frequently featured on the covers of national publications (such as his heartbreaking response to the Sandy Hook school shootings for the New Yorker) and, in 2002, became the first comic artist to be included in the Whitney Biennial. He's about to launch a new strip, "The Last Saturday," has three new book projects in the works, and will be featured in the upcoming exhibition "The Comic Art and Architecture of Chris Ware" at the Art Institute's Ryerson and Burnham Libraries.

4 Kerry James Marshall

Internationally considered one of the foremost painters of his generation, Kerry James Marshall has depicted figurative, multi-layered scenes of the black experience in America throughout his three-decade career. In 2013 he became the sixth artist featured in the National Gallery's Tower Galleries, joining the likes of Mel Bochner and Mark Rothko. His joining David Zwirner in London, with a solo exhibition opening October 2014, further testifies that Marshall is one of the "big boys" in the international circuit and continues to call Chicago home base.

5 Laurie Jo Reynolds

"Legislative artist" Laurie Jo Reynolds co-organized a group called Tamms Year Ten to successfully shutter the Tamms Correctional Center in southern Illinois, notable for its sensory deprivation technique for prisoners. Now she is working on Governor Pat Quinn's reelection campaign and was just hired as the University of Illinois Chicago's first ever Assistant Professor of Public Arts, Social Justice, and Culture, leading the way for activist art to take root in a major public education institution. Her work with Tamms Year Ten is on view this fall in "A Proximity of Consciousness" at SAIC and in "Citizen Culture: Artists and Architects Shape Policy" at the Santa Monica Museum of Art. - See more at: http://art.newcity.com/2014/09/18/art-50-2014-chicagos-artists-artists/#sthash.t4cIktNv.dpuf





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

the very changing economy and urban landscape. That can only be verified by the newspaper and economy reports. Never before has our cities and suburbs been so volatile. Companies are moving into our city and some are relocating out. The amount of strong companies based in the downtown area greatly affect the demand for purchase and rental home. Keeping abreast of the statistics is quite important and added a lot to determining a price to list a unit for. Just checking the improvements, upgrades and recent sales/rental is important, but a lot can change if location growth or decrease has occurred as well.

Another issue is to check the constant changing financial abilities our banks and loan offices are offering. What was available a month or two ago may not be what is offered today or when a contract comes in. So being weekly briefed on the lending markets is greatly of value. Therefore it is important that information offered on listing contract be reviewed during the marketing period. It may be wise to schedule monthly conference calls between owner and realtor to discuss any changes that have happened in the current month and if any adjustments need to be made to help attract a sale/rental.. A question re. rentals: If a buyer purchases a home that currently is tenant occupied, may the buyer make the tenant leave?

No. Buyers cannot force a tenant in an existing lease to vacate just because they are new owners. The rental attachments should have been disclosed on sale contract with a clause that rents received after closing should now be assigned to new owner of property. However a new lease does not have to be entered into if the new owner is planning to not rent again. Once current lease expires, unless a new lease is written with current owner. tenants term in unit is over and should leave, not using security deposit as last months rent. New owner should have received any escrowed funds from previous owner ie: last Month's rent and security deposit to make for a smooth transition.

Always think strategically, it takes a pro player to hit a major league goal so think success and out of the box. You have to be disciplined and patient and have a plan and keep to it. Hold your associates and coworkers to your personal standards. they are a reflection of you in the work place. High intention deseserves high attention. Discuss alternate solutions " How are we going to solve this problem?" Do some research and see if they is any data regarding a past situation and how it was resolved and what methods helped. Seek an agreement between your owner and yourself on what you both want and how you see that happening. Then put it in writing and check things off and make comments as you get to your goal. This will give you the concept that your judging results and not people. Make your marketing a hit by pinpointing areas and age groups and business that would most likely have a candidate for your property.

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


