

### Casino

#### Residents Express Opposition to Casino at The 78

More than 100 South Loop and Chinatown residents attended a virtual meeting March 1 on a casino proposal at The 78, with most expressing opposition. In a separate unscientific poll, 74% of those who took the online survey said they were "highly unsupportive" of the casino proposal. The meeting was hosted by The 78 Community Advisory Council, a group set up in 2019 "as a conduit for community input as construction moves forward" on the megaproject. Council member Josh Ellis told participants on the Zoom call that initially, "a casino was not part of the original proposal. It wasn't part of anybody's proposal in Chicago" — until in 2019, when the General Assembly substantially expanded gaming throughout the state. Ellis noted that four of the five casino proposals the city has received are for sites in or near the South Loop.

The 78 council's survey results showed that while a minority of respondents were optimistic about new jobs and increased revenue for the city and state, the majority of residents are opposed to the casino coming to The 78. Those surveyed said they are concerned about increased crime and traffic, gambling addiction among low-income residents, a potential exodus of families and negative impacts on young children who attend nearby schools.

Ald. Byron Sigcho-Lopez, whose 25th Ward includes The 78 site, said he is "listening very carefully" to the feedback from residents, and questioned whether the original proposal for The 78, which included public financing in the form of TIFs, should be revisited "if this is going to change completely into a casino proposal."

A community group called South Loop Community Against a Casino is also collecting signatures for its <u>petition opposing a casino in the community.</u>

#### **Retired in Chicago**

Where is the line between frugal and cheap?

A restaurant check showed a \$7 upcharge for substituting fruit for meat. The server had said that we could substitute anything, not mentioning a charge.

Although irritated, I wondered whether begrudging a few dollars when restaurants are hurting crosses the line from frugal into cheap. (I'm sidestepping the issue of feeling deceived.)

But if it is cheap to care about a few dollars, why are there coupons?

Frugality is a virtue and cheapness a fault, but where frugal ends and cheap begins is fuzzy.

Online articles describe cheap as looking for the lowest price rather than the best quality and spending too much time hunting a deal. Was it frugal (quality conscious) or cheap (wasteful of time) for me to spend hours searching for the best price on a highly rated cellphone?

Most people look for sales, but fewer take thriftiness as far as I do: Supercuts haircuts, secondhand clothes, modest ethnic restaurants, museum free days, theater ushering.

Finding a deal gives me a kick, although I understand thinking that time could be better spent. Actually, I don't buy much, shopping only when necessary. Limiting consumption is consistent with my politics — it makes for a small carbon footprint. I can relate to the person who wrote advice columnist Amy Dickinson: "I have always been against senseless consumerism. I am a minimalist in almost all aspects of my life."

To me cheap implies ungenerous — such as seldom spending money on others, shortchanging on a tip, and giving little to charity. I hope I'm not cheap like that.

Not acknowledging a difference between antimaterialistic and cheap, people have sometimes encouraged me to spend more on myself. I have been trying to drop more money on experiences that seem worth it,

although with my thrifty habits ingrained, I don't expect to change much at my age.

Perhaps a way to decide whether I take thriftiness too far is to ask whether it affects anything or anyone other than me. For instance, friendships could be strained by one person's reluctance to spend money. Cultural institutions would struggle if everyone took advantage of free days.

The restaurant mentioned at the start recently opened and is probably still finding its feet. I'm glad I paid the bill without making a fuss.




### Damon Galgit, The Promise (Europa 2021)

As children, most of us remember making a promise, linking our baby fingers, and swearing to keep it: "cross my heart and hope to die." Who knew that was no empty oath? The broken promise in Booker-prizewinner Damon Galgut's new novel, **The Promise**, reduces the Swart family—peace-less descendants of land-grabbing, murderous, enslaving Voortrekkers—to dust and ashes. They try to cling to their "not much of a farm...hundreds of miles of brown grass" during the bloody end of apartheid in South Africa and its aftermath of broken promises. Galgut grew up in Pretoria—where Bishop Desmond Tutu led 80,000 of his fellows in protest—the setting for the novel that takes place from the release of Nelson Mandela to the disgrace of Jacob Zuma. The Swarts are "holding on, holding out...an ordinary bunch of white South Africans." They are anything but. Pa Manie owns, and quite lucratively operates, a tourist attraction called "Scaly City," full of creatures as coldblooded as their masters. Ma Rachel, who quietly dies in the first chapter, joined the Dutch Reformed Church after finding herself accidentally pregnant with Manie's son, but returned to her Jewish faith near the end of her life, perhaps "so she won't be buried on the farm, next to her husband." Manie, himself, is felled, says his misanthropic son, by "an ill-fated ambition to break a Guinness world record for living among poisonous serpents" to raise



funds for the family's spiritual leader, Dominie Alwyn Simmers, whose lust for mammon is matched only by what he once felt for his "peculiar sister." Then there are the "alliterative trio" of Swart children: Antone, an army conscript who shot a Sowetan woman during a riot, and then ran away. "Jesus, what he did by deserting the army; he's a hero, not a criminal, amazing how fast that changed." Astrid is a bulimic beauty who converted to Catholicism to escape her boring Calvinist husband and be absolved of her adulterous affair (with President Mbeke?). Introspective Amor ill-named because *nobody* loved her—is a living martyr and AIDs nurse, who ultimately, but impractically, keeps the promise. The narrator swings from empathy to cruelty to random discussions of the funeral business, the suspected homosexuality of a headmistress, or the rantings of a homeless guy who "can see things." The tone is tragic, but awfully funny, in the vein of Kurt Vonnegut or Spaulding Gray—or even Mel Brooks. And Galgut skewers faithless, fallible men of the cloth no less skillfully than Willa Cather or Peter Matthiessen. I was sorry to get to the last page. I think you should start at the first.

### Refugee Kids of Ukraine



President Joe Biden visited Ukrainian refugee families in Warsaw, paying close attention to the children. You may remember Joe's own heart wrenching story about his wife and toddler daughter dying in a car crash. Two Biden sons survived the crash and young Joe suddenly became a single parent, grieving himself and comforting his small boys. President Biden delivered a speech in Warsaw after his meeting with the Ukrainian women and children. He ad libbed, "for God's sake, this man cannot remain in power."

And who doesn't think this?

TV viewing grandmothers everywhere clutch at the sight of little ones in their puffer coats and backpacks walking out of war torn Ukraine. Some have the great fortune of direct action in helping refugee kids.

A friend in London texted: "so I raised \$25k. Ray contacted the Gov. we went to medical supply warehouse in an East EU country. delivered goods to the border, where Dr and crew drove them 250k back to her 60 bed hospital in Ukraine. We are taking two families of refugees-teachers with three children including a 6 month old..."

Another retired friend activated a network of Eastern European contacts, flew from Chicago to Kiev and set up a food distribution center.

Janice, a Polish American I met on the beach in Michigan a few years ago writes from her home in Poland. Check out her donation page below.

#### Notes From Janice in Warsaw March 16, 2022

Now we have 1.6 million Ukrainian refugees in Poland. In Warsaw alone we have 400,000. This is about one quarter of our population. We personally have a Ukrainian refugee family staying with us in our home. Warsaw has only been able to accommodate so many. People have opened their homes, fed them, bought their medicine. It's a private endeavor. Supposedly money is coming to help, but there is absolutely nothing happening. No housing, no public food money.

I'm involved in the children's hospital, providing care and medicine to the Ukrainian refugee children. I've been actively on the board of this children's hospital foundation for years. We already have hundreds hospitalized and there will be an onslaught of need. There are 200,000 Ukrainian refugee children here in Warsaw. If you know anyone who wants to donate

People are sending money to help at the border, but the refugees are there for only 1 day, then they come to live here in Warsaw and other cities in Poland. This is where the need really is, where they are residing and need full services.

P.S. The Ukrainian family is very sweet. They don't speak a word of English, not a word. Nor of Polish. So I am trying to learn Ukrainian.

I dream of having a moment around the fire on the beach in Michiana.

Just a moment of joy and peace.

Thank you for any help you can give to the Ukrainian children in the Warsaw children's hospital.



# Hospital Hell: The Psych Ward During COVID March 8, 2022 by Clarisse Casalino

At first, psych wasn't affected by COVID all that much. The wards emptied more and more as COVID made patients fear coming to the hospital. The

number of beds in psych shrank. More wards were converted to COVID floors and staff was

diverted. As the code-blue announcements rang overhead, I felt a sense of guilt. I was not an ICU nurse, I wasn't yet sweating while doing CPR or witnessing life leave a body. In other words, I was powerless, and to my embarrassment, useless against the pandemic. I wanted to help, but someone had to watch the few patients in our ward. Each evening the city would clap. New York City streets echoed with applause for all of us. I closed the window one night thinking, what more could I do?

As a psych nurse, my training limited my hand, making me unhelpful on a medical ward. What I didn't realize was that, as the weather warmed, my turn would come. I can peg the date to just before the Fourth of July 2020. As the fireworks went off above, hellfire was simmering below. It had been nearly four months of fearful patients avoiding the inside of a hospital. During these months their mental health clinics closed, their support groups were suspended, and virtual care dominated, which left patients without internet access hung out to dry.

When they finally came to us in the psych ward they were really sick. They had gone months without their medications, their support systems had been cut off, and many were laid off from their work. Night after night, day after day, NYPD and EMS brought us patients, each one sicker than the last.

Normally, patients in the wards would display a spectrum of severity. Only a few patients at a time would be considered an extreme case. When there are a high number of these type of cases we'd consider the "acuity" of the psych ward to be high.


As the acuity increases, the level of patient aggression follows. Each ward had a color system to measure the acuity: green, calm; yellow, moderate; red, high; and gray, crisis. By the end of July, yellow dominated the boards. During the fall, a red day was considered a good day. Our wards packed in more and more patients, matches that could light an already explosive scenario. I had never experienced that level of violence in patients. I was a relatively new psych nurse with only a few years experience, but even veterans were appalled. Click here for the rest of the story.



# And the Oscar goes to . . .



All the talk today in the wake of last Night's Academy Awards show seems to be about Will Smith slapping Chris Rock. I'll be honest—in real time I thought it might have been a bit that was supposed to be funny that went bad. But apparently not. (I also completely missed the Janet Jackson wardrobe malfunction in real-time, too. I think I was the better for it.)

Anyway, I've pretty much always tuned into the Oscars—it started when I was a kid and it was a family event. I used to see a lot more movies than I do now. for one thing, it's a part-time job to sort out which movie is streamed from what service. And to get them all you're essentially paying another cable bill. For another, the real-thing big-screen in -person experience is clogged with superheroes and CGI-ed comics. That and animation. I hate animation. Just do.

Usually, somehow, Beth and I have seen one or two nominated films but this time, zilch. So the awards were sort of a way of figuring out which we'd want to bother with (which is its purpose, after all).

The Smith-Rock incident really didn't and doesn't matter much to me. Two other things stuck, though. One was a gag by Regina Hall that kind of went sideways in two ways. First, she said she needed to do covid tests, which is sort of unfunny at its face. Then she asked for "volunteers" to be tested, but called up only hunky and-or dreamy men. What followed flunked on all fronts, mostly because it was just not funny. (And apparently lots of others thought this was weird, too.)

But the thing that struck me, being of a certain age, is that it was the sort of bit that I would have seen on the 60s Johnny Carson Tonight Show, or the Dean Martin show—and would be considered wholly inappropriate today. I distinctly remember a Dean Martin show where Raquel Welch was the guest star. In one skit, Martin played a doctor, and when a man came in saying he wasn't feeling well, Martin's doctor told the patient to go home and take an aspirin. Then Welch's character came in and said she wasn't feeling well. Martin told her to go in the exam room and take off all her clothes. Pretty sure that wouldn't fly today.

I'm not particularly offended by last night or Dean Martin, save for it being sort of juvenile. But flip last night's script to have a male host call up attractive Hollywood women, then frisk them, and, ooh boy. Will Smith and Chris Rock are an afterthought. Mostly, I don't care, but I think it does beg questions about whether sexist, exploitative jokes cut both ways.

I'll probably not remember **any** of it after a couple of days. One thing I will remember, as long as I have the capacity to remember, is when <u>Troy Kotsur</u> became the first deaf man to win an acting Oscar. Beth usually doesn't stay up late, and typically she would've been asleep by the time that award was handed out. But in her part-time role as blog coordinator for Easterseals, which supports people with disabilities, she had a professional interest. (Indeed, it provided fodder for a post at the Easterseals blog.)

When Troy Kotsur was announced as the winner, I heard weeping. I looked and Beth was in full blown tears of joy and tears of relief. It took me, who has lived with Beth for nearly 38 years—37 of which after she lost her sight, completely by surprise.

But it shouldn't have. For all the discussion about equality and equity, it mostly focuses on gender and skin color. Rarely is disability included.

For as long as she's been blind, Beth has resolved to educate and advocate for people by leading as full a life as possible. To advocate by example. But that's really freakin' hard. On one hand, she feels the need to impress the idea that she can do anything sighted people can do. On the other, it's not the same—and most things are harder.

In that glorious moment, I felt, deeply, something that I had always grasped intellectually. But I didn't, until that moment, get how it felt.

Beth called our friend, who is married to a deaf man and is a sign-language interpreter, to share her joy—and our friend was also in tears. Of course, I couldn't keep it together at this point either.

Beth went to bed and I was up alone when CODA won for Best Movie. And it happened again.

# Safe & Sound Blog by Beth Finke Self-Advocacy and the ADA: Don't Miss our Repeat Performance Tomorrow March 31, 2022 at 7 pm

Remember that Self-Advocacy and the ADA panel Skokie Public Library presented via Zoom last November?I was on that panel along with Deirdre Keane (a teacher/librarian who was born with a hearing loss and got a cochlear implant during her freshman year in college), Michele Lee (an experienced finance professional who uses a wheelchair) and Tina Childress (a late-deafened adult with bilateral cochlear implants). That panel was successful enough to motivate an organization called Coming Together to sponsor another self -advocacy panel next week. And just like back in November, next week's panel will be online and free of charge.

Coming Together, now in its 13th season, is a community partnership in Niles Township among organizations in Skokie, Lincolnwood, Morton Grove and Niles, Illinois that "builds bridges of knowledge and understanding among people of different groups and ages." Each year Coming Together highlights a different topic, and in 2022 they are joining community members and expert organizations focusing on the voices, experiences and talents of members of the community with disabilities across Niles Township. And so, next week, on Thursday night, March 31,2022 at 7:00 p.m. Central Time I will be one of four women with disabilities on this hourlong free Zoom panel:

What does self-advocacy look like when navigating the world with a disability? Four panelists from different fields share stories of how they've advocated for reasonable accommodations.

Panelists will share lessons learned and provide tips on fighting for more fair and just treatment in the workplace and beyond.

The four of us will each be given 10 minutes to tell a few personal stories of advocating for ourselves, leaving time afterwards for discussion and questions. My plan is to talk fast and describe three experiences, one a success, another a collaboration, and the third a failure:




- 1. Appearing at a Chicago city court after a cab driver refused me a ride with my Seeing eye dog.
- 2. Graduating from training to volunteer with hospice and never being paired with a patient
- 3. Challenges I faced when the health club I'd been swimming at closed due to COVID and no other indoor pool facility would allow my Seeing Eye dog to lead me poolside to swim laps.



Chicago's historic Studebaker Theater at Fine Arts Building undergoes major multi-million dollar renovation CHICAGO — One of the most cherished theaters in Chicago's history is back for an encore.

The historic Studebaker Theater at the Fine Arts Building on 410 S. Michigan Ave. was established in 1898 and has been a staple in the live theatrical world for over a century.

Icons like Bob Hope, Vincent Price, Sarah Bernhardt, Eartha Kitt, Jessica Tandy, and Martin Sheen have performed on its stage leaving a legendary wake of history.

After years in disrepair, the Studebaker is currently in the final stages of a multi-million dollar renovation. The upgrades include all-new seating installed throughout the venue, enhancements, and modernization to the theater's AV and lighting grid, state-of-the-art technical booth, updated hobbies, and a newly designed VIP lounge on the third floor.

Built in 1885, Chicago's Fine Arts Building was originally designed to house the carriage assembly and showroom for the Studebaker Company. Within a year, the company outgrew the space, paving the way for the building to become Chicago's first fine arts colony, housing some of the most acclaimed artists with national and international impact on the arts.

In 1898, the Fine Arts Building created the historic Studebaker Theater, originally built to house vaudevillian performances and later expanded into large production in the 1920s. With a slew of Hollywood's top headliners, it quickly developed a reputation to be known as one of the most important live theatrical venues in Chicago, receiving landmark status in 1978.

The new Studebaker will have approximately 600 seats, home to many nonprofit and touring productions and special events.

Gun used in South Loop barbershop killing tied to U.S. soldiers accused of trafficking weapons The victim, Gregory Jackson III, was an associate of popular rapper G Herbo.



The South Loop barbershop where a gun allegedly trafficked to Chicago by soldiers was used in a murder.

A handgun used in the South Loop killing of a friend of well-known rapper G Herbo was among a cache of weapons a trio of U.S. soldiers at Fort Campbell, Kentucky, conspired to sell in Chicago, according to court records.

A .40-caliber Glock was used in the killing of Gregory Jackson III at Studio Nineteen barbershop, 1931 S. State St, on Jan. 28, 2021. The gun's serial number, listed in a Chicago police report, matches one of the guns the soldiers are accused of selling.

The Chicago Sun-Times previously reported the Fort Campbell soldiers are accused of selling at least two other weapons that wound up in shootings in Chicago.

One of them, a Glock handgun, was used in a March 26, 2021, mass shooting at a party in the 2500 block of West 79<sup>th</sup> Street that left one man dead and seven wounded, according to federal authorities.

On Wednesday, Mosley's lawyer filed a motion to throw out evidence of the gun as evidence because he says it was obtained without a valid search or arrest warrant.

WGN-TV first reported the link between the barbershop shooting and the gun trafficking case.

The three Fort Campbell soldiers have also been accused of conspiring to sell another gun that was used in an unspecified Chicago shooting on March 11, 2021. There were seven shootings across Chicago that day, according to news reports.

Brandon Miller, who once lived in Chicago, is one of those soldiers. He conspired with Jarius Brunson and DeMarcus Adams to buy more than 90 guns at stores along the Tennessee-Kentucky border where Fort Campbell is located, according to the federal gun trafficking conspiracy case against them in Nashville, Tennessee.

Empty gun cases in a Clarksville, Tennessee, home where Miller lived off the military base matched guns recovered by the Chicago police in killings and shootings, prosecutors said.

In a Feb. 23, 2021, text message with someone with a Chicago telephone number, Miller said, "We gone win this \*war\* we losing the battle but this a marathon not a race," according to prosecutors. In another text, he pledged that he wouldn't turn his back on his gang, federal authorities said.

According to testimony from federal agents, Miller would get an order from someone in Chicago for guns. He'd ask his co-defendants to buy the guns and give them to him. Miller would then fill the order, according to the agents. For the rest of the story, click here.




