the Jazz Showcase, an event she coordinated for many years. Dorothy was the model example of a dedicated neighborhood volunteer and she will be extremely difficult to replace.




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



Election Distraction: Lincoln Park Hibiscus Regan Burke

Rounding the corner by Cafe Brauer, the 115-year old red brick refectory on Lincoln Park Zoo's South Pond, I stopped dead in my tracks at the sight of blooming Chinese-red hibiscus. Hundreds of blossoms the size and shape of CDs preened in the bright sun. They were onionskin thin. I could practically see through them. I inched along the path flower by flower scanning each one for an answer. What. Were. They. Doing. There?

I'd rounded that corner hundreds of times in my life and had never seen those flowers. A woman in a dark green shirt marked with the telltale Lincoln Park Zoo logos wandered by.

"Do you know anything about these flowers?" I shouted.

"Yes, they're Lord Baltimore hardy hibiscus."

"Were they here last year?"

"Nope. We cultivated them."

She introduced herself as the head horticulturist at the Zoo and gave me a hibiscus primer. There are four species of hibiscus native to Illinois around the Zoo and the South Pond.

"Everyone thinks they're tropical. We have a unique collection — the only accredited perennial herbaceous native hibiscus collection in the country."

On the way home, I spotted a couple I've known for years taking their afternoon walk. They informed me they're thinking of buying a summer house in Michigan.

"What? How could you leave here in the summer? Did you know we have four native hibiscus around the South Pond and the Zoo?"

At the time, I thought this fresh information established the best reason to summer in Chicago. I doubled down on what I'd just learned. Without taking a breath I told them the hibiscus feed bees, hummingbirds and butterflies. Each flower on a hibiscus stalk lives only for a day or two, like a daylily. But, the plants keep opening new blooms from July to September. Garden Clubs from all over the Midwest send busloads of flower lovers to gaze at our hibiscus.

"You must walk by the pond and see them!"

That was the summer of 2019. I see them walking from time to time now, a little slower, a little quieter. A few weeks ago, I'd been in the zoo luxuriating in what I've come to think of now, five years later, as my hibiscus. I ran into my friends on the way home and fed them new information.

"Did you see the news?"

"What news?"

There's so much real news or breaking news these days they looked anxious.

"My friend Karen who volunteers at the zoo told me it's in the paper today. Lincoln Park Zoo has just been named a National Botanic Garden!"

"Oh."

"Yep. It's a big deal. There are only two zoos in the country that are botanic gardens."

"Oh yeah? What's the other one?"

"Dunno. Maybe San Diego."

I had no idea what I was talking about. The media and Time Out have touted San Diego plenty. So, I used this acclaim to put the best spin on our zoo.

"And the international Botanic Garden show will be in Chicago in summer 2027. First time its been in the U.S, in 27 years." I said.

"Wow, that's great. Is that like the Chelsea Garden Show?" "Yes! Only better."

"Well, we'll see you around. We need to keep walking."

"Ok. Great to see you. Glad you didn't buy that summer house in New Buffalo."

"Oh, we did buy it. Stayed for a few weekends before the pandemic hit. Tried it that summer for a few weeks. Mistake. Too lonely. You're right. Theres's nothing like Chicago in the summer."

"Ah. It's the flowers, right?"

"Maay-bee".

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Sarai Johnson, Grown Women (HarperCollins 2024).

When my younger daughter graduated from high school just seventeen—she announced to her sister, her aunt, and me that she was "a grown-ass woman." It wasn't clear what she meant, and it scared the be-jeezus out of me. But I was relieved, and impressed, she was ready to try her own life. **Grown Women** is a debut novel spanning 70 years of girls becoming "grown women," leaving their mothers for reasons tragic, wrenching, practical, or felicitous. The story is told through third-person narratives of great-grandmother Evelyn; her daughter, Charlotte; her daughter, Corinna; and her daughter, Camille. It is both terrifying and inspiring; it is not a Hallmark movie. There's way too much drinking, shooting, beating, sex, poverty and loss to qualify. Although the men are more than progenitors, their presence is more affliction than blessing; some provide comfort; most cause harm; some offer both. The female characters, their stories, their living spaces, are so interesting—especially for this old white woman—readers will stick with the sometimes confusing timeline and jarring transitions from granny to mama to baby to grand baby. Sarai Johnson, one hometown reviewer writes, "refreshingly decenters any gazes other than those of Black women" so for some it's like home and for others it's a needed education. Evelyn's photo album is an integral part of the story, and it feels as if we're seeing snapshots of the author's own Black community in Nashville, rural Tennessee, Atlanta, and the nation's capital, rarely featured in mainstream writing. Johnson offers better than Big Mama's


"pearls of wisdom" from these mothers and daughters, for they suffer not just from their own follies, but from cultural and racial limits imposed on them and outside their agency. We can learn how to try to parent, love or learn from our parents, manipulate or tolerate societal pressures, and most importantly empathize with those whose lives are unlike ours—even if they are our own kin. Take note that "[g]rowing a child in your body does not make you that child's mother," but once that woman accepts the role—however reluctantly—as some of these mothers do, "in matters of mothers and daughters, it is always the mother's fault." Fathers, siblings, other relatives, friends, directors, sponsors, coaches, ad infinitum, might confess to this guilt, whether warranted or not. Few of us set out to deliberately destroy a young life. Like Evelyn, whose sins were the most grievous, Johnson encourages the mass of us to do better. We don't forget the past but we can change the present and create a new history. "If we move on we are leaving what we have and starting something completely new. We don't need to do that; we need to ...move forward," so that "what's happening now become[s] more important than what happened in the past...." This is a nice reflection before holiday family get-togethers. Charlotte offers a final thought: "Forgive your god-





In their own words: trying to understand Trump voters

Like many, I'm trying to escape political news since the election. But I can't shut down my thoughts about Trump voters.

How could they?

I want to understand so that I don't hate them.

I'd like to know what they think overrules Trump's racism, misogyny, and overall hatefulness — if those are not why they like him.

"[W]e have too often assumed that Trump voters are racist, sexist, transphobic, or just stupid. I mean, what else could bring someone to vote for him?" historian Jonathan Zimmerman wrote after the election.

Not hanging around with Trump voters, I looked online for explanations in their own words. Here are some comments from various websites.

"It's not because I like his personality, that's for sure. I think he's the one to take care of the economy, the oil issues, and the border issues."

"During Trump's presidency, everything was much lower."

"Food is very expensive. Everything is very expensive."

"I can't wait to afford groceries and gas."

"Everything's gone up for us, and I don't see wages going up, so that's very problematic for people that are just trying to survive and take care of their family."

"The economy was good when Trump was in."

"Trump has a handle on making it about the American economy first and the American worker first."

"I think there is a higher likelihood that we will have a good economy with Trump."

"We just want less crime, secure borders, a strong economy, affordable prices, and fairness in the labor market. We believe President Trump will deliver on those."

"Veterans and homeless and needy citizens suffered as local governments spent billions for newly arrived migrants.... When my mother came to America as a single mother of two, she did not get any benefits."

"As a legal immigrant, I feel good about this. I feel seen."

"Latinos in the past were supportive of the Democratic Party, but it has not been very supportive of us. The bottom line is money." "I lost a lot of jobs just because they wanted to hire someone that was willing to take way-lower pay than normal."

"I am a Gen Z man. Trump never talked down to me, or told me I am the problem, or tried to influence how I should behave."

"I believe that he will not let as many wars happen."

"He speaks of war as something that is bad."

"His election brings me hope for a better future."

"I believe that we need a change, and we have to put Americans first."

Those comments aren't entirely free of prejudice, but most do not sound like they came from the mouths of the Proud Boys.

"Trump's base cannot simply be dismissed as racist deplorables or country bumpkins in red MAGA hats," Rutgers University–Newark professor Alex Hinton told *The Conversation.* "Many people have thoughtful reasons for voting for Trump."

While I disagree that Trump's policies are solutions, people are entitled to judge for themselves how their lives are going.

Financially secure, I'd underestimated how much other people are worried about high prices. I feared Trump's threat to democracy while others feared their families going hungry.

I didn't realize how deep the perception of unfairness is.

I didn't get how much Trump voters consider Democrats sanctimonious and condescending.

None of this is to suggest that Democrats should change our positions and principles. I'm still appalled and terrified by Trump. But we could show a more welcoming attitude when Trump voters have buyer's remorse, as I expect many will. You don't win over people by thinking them racist, sexist, and too stupid to know what's good for them.

It's been a sobering two weeks.

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Deep Drive on the South Side: Cultural Road Tripping in Mike Medina's Mermaid Green 1941 Buick Special Coupe

When the mood is right and old stars are aligned in the sky, Mike Medina will get into his car and drive around the South **Side of Chicago.** He has favorite routes such as South Cottage Grove Avenue and South Chicago Avenue, the latter of which he calls the "bizarro parallel" to North Elston Avenue.

He has his favorite spots like the site of the former McKie's Disc Jockey Show Lounge in the old Strand Hotel at 63rd and Cottage Grove, and the isolated neighborhood of the Southeast Side of Chicago where Medina and his wife Laura Coffey Medina planned to renovate the Schlitz Brewery-Tied House tavern at 9401 South Ewing, which is now the landmarked East Side Tap.

But this is no ordinary ride.

Medina drives a refurbished Mermaid Green 1941 Buick Special Torpedo.

Besides being an object of beauty, it is a vehicle for connection. In mid-September Medina takes me and Chicago photographer Paul Natkin on a three-hour South Side tour in his Buick. Dozens of locals smile, honk their horns, and inquire about the year the car was made. "1945?" asks someone at a bus stop. Medina smiles from under the bill of a vintage newsboy's cap and shouts back, "1941!"

While stopped at a light on Cottage Grove, a CTA bus driver leans out her window and proclaims how the car reminds her of her grandparent's ride.

Medina does not know how many miles the Buick has seen because the odometer is broken. But the automobile clock works. Time is of the essence.

Medina was born in 1974 in Chicago. He grew up in Des Plaines and attended Notre Dame High School in Niles before studying political science at DePaul University. He is a former airline mechanic who repairs lab equipment at the University of Chicago.





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


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Escape from Heaven

Moses and Jesus understood the wonders and genius of God. How each individual has the potential to live a life of honest reflection, faith and good works.

Escape from Heaven was a finalist in two categories of the 2023 New Mexico-Arizona Book Awards: Philosophy and Religion.

Columbia Votes hosts 'Can he actually do that?'

Students had a chance this week to ask political science and law experts their biggest questions about President-elect Donald Trump's second term.

Columbia Votes hosted "Can he actually do that?" on Wednesday, Nov. 20. About 20 people attended the event, which included a presentation from three panelists: Robert Watkins, an associate professor of political science at Columbia College and Arthur Acevedo and Alexandra Filindra, both professors at the University of Illinois Chicago.

Sharon Bloyd-Peshkin, a professor in the School of Communication and Culture and the founder of Columbia Votes, said students are anxious about Trump's re-election, as the Chronicle <u>previously</u> reported.

"So the students that I am in touch with at the college, which is a pretty broad swath, are really crushed by it," she said. "People are really having a tough time processing not only what happened, but what it means that it happened, right?"

According to members of Columbia Votes, that was the inspiration for this event.

Tyler Harding, a senior film and television major and voter registration genius, said the purpose of the event was to break down the issues. "All of those fears and anxieties can kind of build up into just one giant cloud of confusion," he said.

Harding said Columbia Votes decided an expert panel should be included in the conversation so that students would have ample access to credible context, evidence and answers.

Columbia Votes representatives collected possible questions for speakers from a listening post they set up in the Student Center after the election.

Sophomore game art student Taika Clark heard about the event from Columbia's Engage app. "I'm just trying to collect all the information I can right now so we can make actual moves, whatever that will look like," Clark said.

Eryn Young, a junior marketing major, said her biggest concern was addressed during the Q&A portion of the event as well. She was particularly curious about the possibility of Trump remaining in office after his upcoming term. "I'm really glad that that question was asked," she said. "I definitely got a good answer to that."

Some of the questions covered topics such as the role of sanctuary cities, the extent of state power in

abortion and reproductive healthcare, how the homeless population will be affected, LGBTQIA+ rights across the country and how far presidential immunity can stretch.


One student asked about how Trump's pledge to eliminate the Department of Education would affect federal financial aid. As the Chronicle <u>previously reported</u>, the department can't be eliminated without congressional approval, but its budget could be cut.

Filindra said that with Linda McMahon leading the Department of Education, it's very possible that "they may tie Pell Grant access to ideological conformity on campus." McMahon, who ran World Wrestling Entertainment for decades, is Trump's nomination for education secretary, an appointment that has to be confirmed by the Senate. *Copy edited by Doreen Abril Albuerne Rodriguez*

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Container Store To Leave South Loop's Roosevelt Collection Shops

After a sluggish year, the home storage retailer is closing its Roosevelt Road location and another store in Los Angeles due to rising rents.

SOUTH LOOP — The Container Store will close its location in a South Loop shopping center this winter.

The Container Store, 150 W. Roosevelt Road, will be leaving the Roosevelt Collection Shops when the retailer's lease is up in February, employees said. It's one of two stores the retail chain is closing due to rising rents, according to commercial real estate site CoStar;

the other store is in Los Angeles.

The Texas-based home organization company has struggled in recent years. Reports emerged in May that The Container Store could be delisted from the New York Stock Exchange after a dismal fourth quarter last year.

Beyond Inc., the parent company of Bed, Bath and Beyond, announced last month it would be investing \$40 million into The Container Store, but the deal may fall through if the retailer isn't able to secure sufficient funding.

The Container Store is the second retailer in a month to announce its exit from the upscale South Loop shopping center. Children's boutique Kido Chicago announced it would be closing last month.

In Five Years, Chicago Has Barely Made Progress on Its Court-Ordered Police Reforms. Here's Why.

Reporting Highlights

- Tipping Point: After years of halting progress and minimal compliance, Chicago's consent decree to reform its police department is at what one observer calls "a tipping point."
- A Hefty Bill: Chicago has already spent hundreds of millions of dollars on the reform effort, and taxpayers will likely have no choice but to foot the expensive bill for years to come.
- Disillusionment: Advocates and citizens are losing faith after multiple mayors and police chiefs failed to deliver.

These highlights were written by the reporters and editors who worked on this story.

In the five and a half years since the Chicago Police Department agreed to extensive oversight from a federal judge, there have been bursts of activity to address the brutality and civil rights violations that led to the agreement.

Court hearings: more than a hundred. Meetings: hundreds. Money: hundreds of millions in Chicago taxpayer dollars allocated to making the court-ordered reforms, known as a consent decree, a reality.

But the record of actual accomplishment is meager.

Chicago police haven't crafted a system for officers to work with residents to address threats to public safety.

They haven't completed <u>a mandatory study of where officers are assigned</u> throughout the city and whether changes would help thwart crime.

And they have <u>failed to move forward with a plan to alert</u> <u>police brass</u> about which officers have been accused of misconduct more than once and might need counseling, retraining or discipline.

In fact, all told, police have fully complied with just 9% of the agreement's requirements. And while excessive force complaints from citizens have dropped, complaints about all forms of misconduct have risen.

Sheila Bedi, an attorney who represented the coalition of police reform groups that sued the city years ago, called the faltering reform effort a "tragedy."

"It has been a waste of time and money," said Bedi, a Northwestern University law professor. "It has been nothing more than an exercise in pushing paper."

A review by WTTW News and ProPublica of the efforts in Chicago since 2019 shows Bedi's bleak view is supported by a range of assessments produced for the court and is also widely held among advocates, academics and officials following the process.

The goal is to emerge from the consent decree by 2027 with a police force finally ready to move beyond a long history of civil rights violations targeting Black and

Latino Chicagoans. But the city is now on a path to devote substantial resources and large amounts of money to the reform effort for years beyond that. It's a trajectory that echoes what happened in Oakland, where the police department continues to be marred by scandal and remains under federal court oversight more than 20 years into its consent decree.

No one in a position of power or oversight has pushed forcefully or effectively to make the process move faster, WTTW News and ProPublica found. Six permanent and interim superintendents have led CPD since 2019 and the city has had three mayors, all of whom vowed to implement the consent decree but failed to make good on those promises with money and other resources.

In addition, the Chicago City Council has repeatedly failed to exercise its authority to oversee CPD's operations and demand quicker change. The council has approved \$667 million to go toward implementing the decree since 2020, but at least a quarter of the city's annual allotment goes unspent each year, a WTTW News analysis found.

At the same time, inside the federal courtroom, the courtappointed monitoring team has never demanded sanctions for the city's slow pace. Similarly, judges overseeing the decree have not expressed concerns about the lack of significant advances.

No major city exemplifies the stubborn problems of police misconduct more than Chicago, where a series of civil cases and wrongful convictions have led to expensive court settlements that regularly cost the city more than \$80 million a year. Distrust in the community now makes attacking the city's crime rate even harder.

Now many of the city's reform advocates have lost faith in the process and are increasingly concerned that the opportunity for lasting reform is slipping away. Surveys of Chicagoans completed as part of the consent decree show a clear drop in confidence that there will be lasting and positive change.

The process has its defenders, including current Illinois Attorney General Kwame Raoul, whose predecessor sued the city to force it to agree to federal court oversight. Raoul still believes the consent decree is the best way of "making these necessary reforms a reality."

But he also appears to be losing patience. Raoul warned last week that he would seek sanctions against the city if Mayor Brandon Johnson did not reverse the planned cuts. "I must remind you that the consent decree is not optional," Raoul wrote to the mayor. "The City of Chicago must deliver on its consent decree obligations."

Johnson rarely speaks publicly about the need to reform the police department, instead focusing on efforts to improve officer morale and reduce crime. He declined to be interviewed for this story but has told reporters he is committed to ensuring CPD "engages in constitutional policing."

Police searching for group of armed males who committed 17 robberies on South, Southwest Sides

Chicago police are alerting South Side residents about more than a dozen recent robberies committed by the same group.

The 17 robberies date back to Oct. 19, but 15 of them occurred between Nov. 10 and Friday, according to police. They happened in the Archer Heights, Bronzeville, Chicago Lawn, Gage Park, Hyde Park, South Loop, Washington Park and Woodlawn neighborhoods. In each case, three to six men with handguns and rifles and wearing dark clothing and ski masks exited a stolen car, approached the victims, and took their belongings. Several of the victims were "pistol-whipped or battered," police said.

The robbers are described by police as men between 18 and 25 years old. The stolen cars they drove include a 2014 black Maserati Quattroporte, a 2017 dark blue Maserati Quattroporte, a 2015 black Jeep Grand Cherokee and another black Jeep Grand Cherokee, police said.

COPA investigating after off-duty CPD officer exchanges fire with two people in South Loop; no one injured

A man, 25, was on the sidewalk in the first block of West Polk Street at 3:45 a.m. when two people approached him, police said. 

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
